Message from our Chairperson

“Perhaps your hunger to belong is always active and intense because you belonged so totally before you came here. This hunger to belong is the echo and reverberation of your invisible heritage.”

When reflecting on the year just passed, these words from the great Irish philosopher and guardian of our heritage, John O'Donohue, repeatedly came to mind.

We don't always think of heritage as being invisible. After all, we can see very clearly the natural beauty of our landscapes, hear very clearly the stories that educate us about our past and can reach out and touch the built heritage constructed by our ancestors. What is invisible, though, is how these experiences make us feel, the sense of belonging they give us. In the Heritage Council, our job is not to give people that feeling. Our job is to facilitate the people who can, and I am proud to say that this is a job we did particularly well last year.

In 2022, the Heritage Council received its largest budget since 2009 of €13.8M. With this increased level of funding, we supported more heritage practitioners, local authorities, community groups and heritage organisations than ever before in our 28-year history. The funding we issued through grants increased 13% to €6.6M, support for heritage infrastructure increased 15% to €2.6M, and funding for our strategic programmes increased by 35% to €1.6M.

We could not be delivering for our sector in this way were it not for the continued support of Minister Darragh O'Brien TD, Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage; Minister of State Malcolm Noonan TD, Minister of State for Heritage and

Electoral Reform; and other colleagues in the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage. I would like to take this opportunity to thank them and I look forward to collaborating with them again in 2023.

As the organisation continues to mature, so too will its vision, and 2022 was in many ways a time of transition for that vision. It signalled the end of our previous strategic plan, ‘Heritage at the Heart’, where one of the high-level goals was *‘to nurture in our people a sense of belonging by enhancing their sense of identity and place’*.

When attempting to measure if we had been successful in achieving this goal, I began to reflect on the people and the groups I met in 2022. I thought of the wonderful Irish Community Archives Network (iCAN), a community heritage initiative coordinated by the National Museum of Ireland in collaboration with the Heritage Council and local authorities, encouraging and supporting communities to collect and share their local history and heritage online.

In July last year, iCAN hosted the Community Archives and Heritage Group conference in Galway and as Chairperson of the Heritage Council, I was honoured to address attendees. More importantly, I had the opportunity to meet the volunteers and local historians who often at great expense, safeguard precious information with enormous academic, historical and emotional value. Thanks to our increased funding, the Heritage Council was able to commit in 2022 to funding the expansion of the iCAN initiative and team, facilitating

those who help reveal our invisible heritage to us.

It was also a year when we began to look towards the future. Our new five-year plan, [Our Place in Time](#) which was drafted in 2022 under the expert stewardship of my fellow Council member Sheila Pratschke, was [officially launched in February 2023](#). It’s a strategy that looks to broaden the scope of our sphere of influence and identifies groups for whom uncovering the mysteries of their invisible heritage might not be so straightforward.

An ethnographic study of young Travellers conducted by Sindy Joyce in 2018 spoke about the tragic phenomenon of Travellers ‘hiding in plain sight’. In other words, hiding or cloaking their identity for fear of discrimination or stigmatisation. That any individual would feel compelled to repress his or her heritage in this way is deeply troubling and something our new strategy seeks to rectify. We are committed to the development of a Traveller Heritage Strategy in partnership with the community. I am pleased to say that work began on this already in 2022 through a series of discussions with Pavee Point Traveller and Roma Centre and The Irish Traveller Movement about how we can work together to support the protection of our Traveller heritage.

When we talk of the search for belonging, there is no festival which grounds me more each year than our flagship programme, National Heritage Week. Every year, the thousands of National Heritage Week events in August enable a nationwide celebration of our heritage, and we committed over €510,000 in 2022 to ensure the success of one of Ireland's largest cultural festivals.

I try to attend as many events as I possibly can each year and am always left wanting more. I am consistently amazed by the inventive ways people manage to tell stories from the past that mean something for people today. One event which did this particularly well in 2022 was the [Irish Wheelchair Charity Shop in Letterkenny](#) which collected old items from Donegal. Separately, they collected old stories from Letterkenny and then paired up each item with a story. The stories were tagged to the items and visitors to the shop were invited to browse through them to learn about their county's past inhabitants.

We are determined to grow National Heritage Week within the lifetime of the new strategy and to bring these events to as wide a range of people as possible. Towards the end of 2022, the Heritage Council appointed Ronan Healy, our first in-house National

Heritage Week Programme Manager. This is a hugely positive development which is sure to assist in the achievement of this goal.

I want to finish up by thanking my colleagues on the board of the Heritage Council for their assistance and the contribution they make in a voluntary capacity to protecting Ireland's heritage. I also want to acknowledge the excellent work of the Chief Executive and staff of the Heritage Council who work hard to deliver on the Council's mandate and look forward to working with the Heritage Council's expanded team in the years ahead.

Message from our CEO

Our day-to-day work in the Heritage Council involves a constant shifting of attention between the three pillars of heritage; natural, built and cultural. Or perhaps it might be more accurate to say that there is a great deal of multitasking at play. But in any given year, for whatever reason, one of these pillars may require more focus than the others.

Reviewing 2022 from this vantage point, what stands out for me are the achievements made in terms of our natural heritage and biodiversity in a year where so much of our work was defined by the looming challenges of climate change and biodiversity loss.

The tone was set at the beginning of the year when Minister of State for Heritage Malcolm Noonan launched *Heritage Ireland 2030*, describing climate change and biodiversity as “a key focus” of the plan, and remarking that “the actions in the strategy reflect the huge challenges facing Ireland’s heritage, particularly for nature and biodiversity loss.”

Meanwhile, biodiversity and sustainable heritage were announced as the primary themes for National Heritage Week in 2022,

paving the way for some beautiful and innovative events on these subjects.

Against that backdrop, it was hugely gratifying to be able to formally announce our new biodiversity officer programme in 2022, which will see a dedicated biodiversity officer appointed to every local authority in the country by the end of 2024. The announcement last year coincided with the appointment of the Heritage Council’s first Head of Heritage and Climate Change, Catherine Casey, who joins us following almost 20 years of exemplary work as Laois Heritage Officer and who will oversee the programme, amongst many other functions.

As I write this introduction in early summer 2023, [twelve biodiversity officers](#) have already begun this important work which for the first time, will enable county councils to benefit from the expertise of a biodiversity officer in its decision-making.

Although it is never glamorous to discuss the necessity of good governance structures, it is nonetheless often very important. In December 2022, we saw the conclusion of a long and complex process resulting in the

restructuring of the National Biodiversity Data Centre (NBDC) as a company limited by guarantee (CLG); a move with potentially profound effects on how we collect and manage biodiversity. This new structure will ensure the long-term protection of this important service, providing a renewed confidence for NBDC staff and the public.

The NBDC had been operating as a contract for service. What this means in layman's terms is that the organisation could not engage in long-term planning, could not be certain of multi-annual resourcing, was restricted in its ability to bid for funding from other sources and did not have a board in place to provide expert oversight. Its transition to a CLG in 2022 removes those obstacles and is a major victory for biodiversity in Ireland.

Bringing projects like this from conception to closure is of course incredibly gratifying, and like any project worth achieving, takes time, resources and patience. But amidst the daily strain of deadlines, targets, meetings and obligations, I do think it's very important to make time for dialogue, for reflection and for exchanging ideas.

That's why one of the highlights last year for me was the National Biodiversity Conference in Dublin Castle in June, and as I write, I'm reminded now of the wonderful people I met and the inspiring messages they delivered.

The Heritage Council hosted a session during the conference where Dr Aoibhinn Ní Shúilleabháin, then at the very beginning of her journey as Chair of the Citizens' Assembly on Biodiversity Loss, (to which the

Heritage Council also made a submission in 2022) provided a wonderful overview of the mechanics of how the citizens' assembly works, offering an uplifting insight into the power and transparency of our democracy.

I was also particularly struck by the words of Dr Brendan Dunford, co-founder of Burrenbeo Trust (a Charity often in receipt of Heritage Council Funding) who said:

“When the pocket, the head and the heart are working in tandem, that's when magical things happen and we begin to see communities truly become stewards and guardians of the heritage of their own place.”

It was a simple yet powerful message, and one which resonated deeply with me and with the work of the Heritage Council. Along with my colleagues, we do our best to ensure that this trinity of financial resources, knowledge, and desire are always present.

When I was appointed CEO in 2019, the Heritage Council's annual expenditure was €8M; in 2022 it has reached a high of €13.8M, and it is important to acknowledge how this increase in funding has allowed the Heritage Council to bolster and support our sector.

Our 11 strategically-funded programmes received over €4M in 2022 while hundreds of community and voluntary heritage groups were awarded €1.5M to complete heritage projects. In addition, the €510,000 that went towards National Heritage Week facilitated almost 2,000 events by 920 organisers allowing thousands of people to enjoy the best of what Irish heritage has to offer.

Our Heritage Capacity Fund supported 28 heritage-focused organisations, such as the Irish Peatlands Conservation Council and the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings covering their operational costs, and nearly €1.4M awarded to county councils through our Historic Towns Initiative Scheme

With greater funding available in 2022, the Heritage Council was also able to address some other pressing issues within the sector. A new funding scheme, the Heritage Stewardship Fund, was established to support staff in public bodies and third-level educational institutes working on the physical preservation of heritage objects whose core remit may not be fully focused on heritage, but whose work can nonetheless have an impact on the protection of unique heritage assets.

Of course, and as Brendan put it, we know that without specialist knowledge, funding is only one-third of the picture. One of the most satisfying achievements of my tenure to date has been the 66% increase in staff numbers since 2019 with 7 new positions created at the Heritage Council in 2022 alone. This additional capacity allows us to explore new territories, helps to generate new ideas and injects expertise into our work which will have far reaching benefits for the sector. In short, the impact of this development is immense.

Knowledge, of course, is attained through education. And I am happy to report that 2022 saw a deepening integration of our work with educational institutes and initiatives. In July, we welcomed the first [talented craftspeople](#) into the inaugural All-Ireland Heritage Skills Programme, a course aiming to preserve heritage building skills at risk of being lost, and which we developed in partnership with the Prince's Foundation and

the Historic Environment Division in Northern Ireland.

As I write, we are at an advanced stage of the recruitment process for the second year of this programme.

Meanwhile, our Conservation Internship Scheme supported the appointment of [three interns](#) in 2022; we partnered with the Technological University of the Shannon to deliver the Certificate in Energy Renovation for Traditional Buildings, a course introducing participants to the fundamental principles of energy renovation; and our Heritage in Schools programme for primary schools continued to flourish, bringing the wonder of heritage to children all over the country with 2,535 visits recorded to 998 schools reaching 55,000 children.

In 2023, we want to build on this scheme, and begin the process of introducing heritage to the curriculum at the post-primary level. As I write, we are recruiting a Heritage in Education Policy Development Officer to help deliver this objective.

The third ingredient, heart, comes very easily to our sector and I am fortunate enough to bear witness on a daily basis the energy and resilience of Ireland's heritage professionals and volunteers.

Few people epitomise this drive more than the great [Teddy Fennelly](#), our 2022 Heritage Hero who I had the pleasure of meeting on multiple occasions throughout the year. His life's work is a rich tapestry of heritage preservation with his commitment to the story of Colonel James Fitzmaurice and the first East-West transatlantic flight arguably his greatest contribution to Irish heritage.

I mentioned our new staff members who

will, of course, need time to fully settle in, as we all adapt to a changed world of hybrid working. This has coincided with the departure on a career break of a very experienced colleague in Head of Finance Paula Drohan and I would like to pay tribute to the magnificent service that Paula has given the Heritage Council over many years.

2022 also signals the end of our previous Strategic Plan, and the beginning of our new five-year plan, '[Our Place in Time](#)', which was written in 2022. It is an ambitious programme of work which sets the direction we need to bring heritage over the next five years.

Finally, I want to thank the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage (DHLGH), including Minister Darragh O'Brien TD, Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage and Minister of State Malcolm Noonan TD, Minister of State for Heritage and Electoral Reform. Both ministers were

generous with their time, participating in various events and supporting our work. I am grateful, too, to the officials at the Heritage Division, DHLGH, whose ongoing support and counsel I appreciate.

I would also like to thank our partners in local government, especially the local authority heritage officers. The cooperation of our colleagues across a range of public service agencies and businesses continues to be invaluable support in all aspects of our work, as does the co-operation of civil society groups and the not-for-profit sector. I am very proud of their loyalty, commitment, energy and innovation on behalf of the heritage sector.

I look forward with optimism to Council continuing its work of increasing public participation in heritage in all its expressions.



Who we are


The Heritage Council is a public body whose role is to propose policies for the identification, protection, preservation and enhancement of our national heritage.

Strategic Programmes

National Biodiversity Data Centre

Established in 2006, the National Biodiversity Data Centre (NBDC) is a Heritage Council programme which collects and manages data to document Ireland's wildlife resources and to track how our biodiversity is changing.

Budget 2022: €1.677M. Increased from €1.246M in 2021.

Progress: In December 2022, [we announced](#) that the National Biodiversity Data Centre was incorporated as a Company Limited by Guarantee. John McCarthy, former Secretary General, was appointed as Chairperson of the board of the NBDC. The establishment of this new company will ensure that information on Ireland's biodiversity will be collected, managed and made available in line with modern demands.

2022 highlights: The engagement by the Citizen Science network continued to grow in 2022, with 175,000 new records submitted to Ireland's Citizens Science Portal during the year. Since the portal was launched, records have been submitted by more than 30,000 different citizen scientists. The citizen science network also delivers an extensive network of monitoring stations for the suite of monitoring programmes operated by the Centre. In 2022, the monitoring network delivered counts from 222 separate transects, 162 sampling sites, and 1,297 insect monitoring counts.



Local Authority Heritage Officer Programme

The Heritage Officer Programme is a key strategic partnership between the Heritage Council and local authorities. It was established in 1999 to raise levels of heritage expertise within local authorities.



Budget 2022: €657,890. Increased from €626,657 in 2021.

Progress: Kilkenny County Council welcomed Regina Fitzpatrick as its new Heritage Officer in December following the departure of Dearbhala Ledwidge from the role to a new position in Kilkenny County Council.

2022 highlights: The Heritage Officer Network Training and Development Programme made a welcome return to in-person events. The Network visited Carlow, Clare, Monaghan, and Kilkenny. These sessions are a great opportunity for the network to learn from guest speakers, and each other, as well as getting out and about to see some of the great work being done by the Heritage Officer Programme in action.

Local Authority Biodiversity Officer Programme

The Biodiversity Officer Programme is a new strategic partnership between the Heritage Council and local authorities, established in 2022. The programme aims to ensure a Biodiversity Officer is employed by every local authority by the end of 2024.

Local Authority Biodiversity Officers will work at the city and county level collecting data on biodiversity, carrying out conservation projects, developing policy, providing advice and information and raising awareness.

The programme is being led by the Heritage Council, who provide funding for the salary costs of each officer.

Progress: The effective collaboration during the year between the Heritage Council, the County and City Management Association and the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage in steering the programme to implementation phase demonstrates the power and effectiveness of these partnerships.

2022 highlights: In 2022, twenty-one local authorities responded to a call for applications, and ten were approved to start recruitment of a Biodiversity Officer under phase one of the new programme.

National Heritage Week


National Heritage Week (NHW) is an annual programme of events run by the Heritage Council celebrating Ireland's natural, built and cultural heritage.

Budget 2022: €510,027. Increased from €432,591 in 2021.

Progress: National Heritage Week made a full return to in-person events in 2022 as well as continuing to showcase digital heritage projects, which proved so popular during the Covid years.

A new feature was added to the NHW website which allows participants and organisers to create their own bespoke National Heritage Week 'Events Trail' which they can print or share online with family and friends.

National Heritage Week Projects by County



2022 highlights: One of the standout projects which won the NHW Sustainable and Inclusive Event Award was the 'Selling the Past Exhibition' by the Irish Wheelchair Charity Shop Letterkenny.

The shop collected a number of heritage items from Donegal and worked with the Donegal County Museum to find stories and events from the county's past that would link the donated items to those stories. The stories were tagged to the items and visitors to the shop were invited to browse through them to learn about their county's past inhabitants.

For example, the shop was given old-fashioned red hardback books which were used to tell the story of a woman called Fanny Carr from Letterkenny who during WWII, and because of the emergency, had no access to cosmetics. She happened to be a huge lover of film and wanted to be able to wear makeup like the big Hollywood stars.

In lieu of makeup, she would wet her finger, rub it against the red Sacred Heart Messenger book and rub it on her cheeks.



National Heritage Week Projects by focus area



Heritage in Schools

The Heritage in Schools scheme is an initiative which facilitates visits to primary schools by a range of specialists on Ireland's natural, cultural, and built heritage.



Budget 2022: €507,148. Increased from €420,515 in 2021.

Progress: ‘Heritage Keepers’ is a free programme for schools and communities which had a very successful year in 2022. The programme enables these groups to work together to explore the built, natural, and cultural heritage of their local place and then plan action or actions to enhance their place.

It is a Heritage Council partnership with Burrenbeo Trust with the programmes delivered to 53 communities, schools and teachers around Ireland throughout the year.

2022 highlights:

Heritage Keepers participated in the ‘Communities for Heritage’ networking and skills day during National Heritage Week on the 20th of August.



Irish Walled Towns Network

Established by the Heritage Council in 2005, the role of the Irish Walled Towns Network (IWTN) is to unite and co-ordinate the efforts of local authorities involved in the management and conservation of historic walled towns in Ireland, both North and South. There are 31 member towns in the network.

There are 31 member towns



Budget 2022: €403,707.

Progress: The network expanded with the addition of 2 new member towns: Naas, Co. Kildare and Fore, Co. Westmeath, bringing the network total to 31.

2022 also saw the appointment of Eimear O'Connell as Project Manager, and Peter Carey as Chair of the Network.

Peter Carey is a former local authority chief executive. He retired in 2021 as CEO of Kildare County Council having served a total of 40 years in local government in six different local authorities in Carlow, South Tipperary, Limerick, Waterford and Laois, as well as Kildare.

2022 highlights: The return to IWTN in-person events in 2022 was a huge boost, and included the long-standing walled town days in Youghal, Loughrea and Athenry with record attendances in Athenry (5,500+) and Youghal (12,000).

Conservation works to town walls took place in Athlone, New Ross, Athenry and Limerick.



Collaborative Town Centre Health Check

Created in 2016, the Collaborative Town Centre Health Check (CTCHC) programme aims to establish a robust approach to undertaking ‘health checks’ in historic Irish towns through surveys and subsequent actions based on findings.

Budget 2022: €67,188.

Progress: The conclusion of a process which began in 2020 was realised in July when the Tipperary Town CTCHC report was launched. The report provides clear recommendations outlining the steps for the next phase of the historic town’s revitalisation.

The Kilkenny report was also launched by Minister of State for Heritage and Electoral Reform Malcolm Noonan TD in December.

2022 highlights: The new National Implementation Plan for the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) 2022-2024 was launched in October setting out strategic objectives and actions to strengthen Ireland’s implementation structures to achieve the SDGs.

The approach taken by the CTCHC programme in terms of how it implemented SDGs at local level was named as a case study in the plan, meaning that the wider plan incorporates the methods adopted by the programme.


The CTCHC programme was selected as a case study the Government’s new National Implementation Plan for the Sustainable Development Goals 2022-2024.



Museum Standards Programme for Ireland

The Museum Standards Programme for Ireland (MSPI) is an accreditation scheme for the Irish museum sector. It aims to raise professional standards in collections care, museum governance and management, and visitor services. There are 61 participants in the programme in 2022.

Budget 2022: €64,206.

Progress: The Programme returned to onsite assessments in September following two years of virtual visits while 15 MSPI Participants submitted accreditation applications in 2022.

2022 highlights: The MSPI Awards Ceremony returned as a live event at Kilkenny Castle in July. Over 60 representatives from MSPI Participants and the Irish museum sector attended the ceremony.

A number of training programmes were delivered to MSPI participants throughout the year, with the 'Developing an Exhibition on a Limited Budget' training by Museum Consultant Joanne Clark receiving particularly positive feedback.

Heritage Maps

The Heritage Maps project, coordinated by the Heritage Council, is an online facility which allows users to look at a wide range of built and natural heritage data sets in map form.

It can be used to create customised maps where one can identify specific points of interest (Ireland's high crosses, historic graves, UNESCO sites, round towers etc.) and study local flora and fauna.

Budget 2022: €59,174.

Progress: A new coastal and marine climate adaptation viewer is ready for deployment following the collation of several large new State data collections being made openly available for the first time. This new viewer will create an excellent baseline of coastal and marine data and facilitate best practise in understanding the needs of our natural and built heritage in the face of climate change issues.

2022 highlight: The introduction of our 'Monday Mappery' posts across our social media platforms has brought many new users to the Heritage Maps platform. These posts look at historic maps of Ireland, analysing the social, political, cartographic and geographic elements and changes as Ireland was mapped over many centuries.

Adopt a Monument

The Adopt a Monument (AaM) scheme provides expertise, mentoring and support to encourage communities to ‘adopt’ a monument in their area to ensure ongoing maintenance and greater protection through increased civic value. There are currently 22 participants in the scheme adopting a monument.



Portlaoise Tidy Towns adopted Old St Peter’s Church and received a mentor award in 2022.

Budget 2022: €56,222. Increased from €50,424 in 2021.

Progress: In 2022, five new groups joined the scheme:

- Baltimore Community Council Ringfort Sub Group adopted Baltimore Ringfort in Co. Cork
- Castledermot Historical Society adopted Dunmanoge Church and Graveyard in Co. Kildare
- Inniskeen Enterprise and Development Group adopted Inniskeen Motte in Co. Monaghan
- Dunkineely Community Ltd adopted Killaghtee Church, Cross and Graveyard in Co. Donegal
- Friends of St James Church adopted St James Church and Graveyard in Dingle, Co. Kerry

2022 highlight: One of the highlights of 2022 was presenting groups that joined the scheme in 2016 and 2017 with their mentor awards. This award acknowledges the hard work and achievements of groups that have been part of Adopt a Monument for over six years and recognises the value of these groups as mentors to those who have just joined the scheme.



All-Ireland Heritage Skills Programme

The All-Ireland Heritage Skills Programme is a course aiming to preserve heritage building skills that are at risk of being lost by supporting those already working in the construction sector to push their skills to the next level.

Developed by the Prince's Foundation in partnership with the Heritage Council in Ireland and the Historic Environment Division of Northern Ireland's Department for Communities, the programme will benefit aspiring craftspeople from both Northern Ireland and Ireland.

Budget 2022: €57,218.

Progress: The establishment of this collaborative programme provides an opportunity to keep many traditional skills alive, and ensure they continue to play a role in conserving our past, and importantly defining the role that they can continue to play in the 21st century.

The All-Ireland Heritage Craft Programme brings together six students with a demonstrated passion for their particular trade, on a full time 12-month course, providing opportunity to gain practical experience in heritage building skills as well as the opportunity to work towards an Level 3 NVQ Diploma in Heritage Skills (Construction).

2022 highlights: To launch the All-Ireland Heritage Skills Programme 2022, a welcome event was held at Hillsborough Castle near Belfast. Representatives from the Prince's Foundation, the Heritage Council and the Historic Environment Division Northern Ireland welcomed the students to the programme.

Students met each other before a tour of the Northern Ireland Heritage Skills Centre, Moira. The group were given a tour of the workshops by craftspeople. The Prince's Foundation invited the group to have a private tour of Hillsborough Castle and restored gardens. Special attention was given to the crafts involved in the restoration of the castle and gardens.

Strategic Investments

Heritage Capacity Fund

The Heritage Capacity Fund (HCF) aims to build the capacity of non-governmental organisations working in the heritage sector in Ireland by providing funding towards their core costs.

Budget 2022: €918,824. Increased from €645,735 in 2021.

Progress: Following a digital promotion campaign, the Heritage Council welcomed an almost 30% increase in applications from organisations seeking funding under the scheme.

2022 highlights: The Offaly Archives were a worthy beneficiary of funding under the HCF in 2022. Heritage Council funding has supported the salary of a full-time professional archivist, accounting for 57.5% of Offaly Archives core costs in 2021.

Funding last year also covered urgent conservation works on items of significant cultural heritage, namely the cleaning and paper conservation of the surviving Birr workhouse registers and a very badly damaged minute book from the same collection. In 2022, Heritage Council core funding of €40,000, represents 50% of the Archives core costs.



The Discovery Programme Centre for Archaeology and Innovation Ireland

Established in 1991, the mission of the Discovery Programme is to explore Ireland's past and its cultural heritage by conducting advanced research in Irish archaeology and related disciplines and by disseminating its findings widely. The Discovery Programme is structured as a company limited by guarantee and employs 9 staff, compared to 8 in 2021. The Discovery Programme is led by Dr John O'Keeffe, CEO. Tom Collins chairs the Board of Directors.

Budget 2022: €814,000. Increased from €740,000 in 2021.

Progress: The Discovery Programme formally opened its new offices in Merchant's Quay in Dublin in November. The day was marked with a garden party attended by the CEO and Chairperson of the Heritage Council, Minister for Heritage Malcolm Noonan TD, and members of the Discovery Programme including the board of directors and its chairperson.

2022 highlights: The Discovery Programme supported the Heritage Council's Adopt a Monument scheme working with the local community in Baltimore to explore the enigmatic earthwork monument at Church Strand Bay. The team conducted geophysical surveys and digital mapping of the monument, and hosted an open day to share the findings with the local community. The local community also used the results of the work as part of National Heritage Week 2022.



Irish Landmark Trust

Irish Landmark Trust (ILT) is a non-profit organisation that finds interesting and unusual properties (such as lighthouses, castles, and gate lodges) in need of conservation, and gives them new life. Since 1992, the Irish Landmark Trust has been turning historic buildings into self-catering holiday accommodation. The Irish Landmark Trust is structured as a company limited by guarantee. It employs 12 staff and is led by Niamh Lunny, CEO. Michael O'Boyle chairs the Board of Directors.

Budget 2022: €329,489. Increased from €296,753 in 2021.

Progress: The Heritage Council provided funding to ILT this year to enable eight property condition reports to be carried out on properties which were last restored 20 years ago. These reports will be used to plan a three-to-five-year programme of maintenance work to ensure each property is maintained in the best condition to ensure their survival.

2022 highlights: In 2022 the Heritage Council provided an additional €89,489 in capacity funding which supported important conservation work to five Irish Landmark Trust properties. Three of these properties, Loop Head, Galley Head, and St John's Point are lighthouse properties that suffer from continual exposure to extreme weather conditions.



Conservation Internship Programme

The Conservation Internship Programme provides support to national cultural institutions to enable them to offer internship placements to the very best conservation graduates. The internships, ranging from nine to 12 months in length, enable interns to develop highly specialist skills while working in world-class heritage institutions, supporting them to establish their professional careers through caring for objects in Ireland's national collections of cultural heritage.



Budget 2022: €33,402. Increased from €21,997 in 2021.


Progress: The Heritage Council supported the appointment of three interns in 2022:

- A 12-month painting conservation with the National Gallery of Ireland (where the intern spent six months at the National Gallery of Ireland and six months at Dublin City Gallery, the Hugh Lane)
- A nine-month books and paper conservation internship at the National Library of Ireland
- A nine-month books and paper conservation internship at the Chester Beatty Library

2022 highlights: Two Heritage Council interns, Hoa Perriguey at the Chester Beatty Library and Gaelle Lefevre at the National Library, were able to attend the renowned Ligatus Summer School during their internship, which was held at the Edward Worth Library in Dublin in 2022.

Grant Schemes

Community Heritage Grant Scheme (CHGS)

This scheme supports projects that improve access and inclusion to heritage sites, projects that apply good heritage practice to the management of places, collections or objects (including buildings), and supports the purchase of essential equipment.

Budget 2022: €1.5M.

Progress: This year, the scheme placed further emphasis on encouraging applications focused on improving access to heritage activities for people with disabilities, as well as projects addressing the heritage of minority groups, new communities, and Traveller heritage.

Some excellent applications were received including a project from the Hunt Museum entitled, ‘Making the Hunt Museum work better for the Visually Impaired’

This involved:

- The introduction of an audio descriptive guide within the galleries
- The redisplay of one object incorporating a touch screen interactive
- The incorporation of a touch screen interactive to highlight one area of the collection

2022 highlight: The Kinny Cally Hall Restoration Project, Co. Donegal, funded through the CHGS in 2022, was particularly interesting.

Kinny Cally Hall is a one-room stone structure near St Johnston, Donegal, and a popular place for social gatherings and traditional music in the 1920s, '30s, and '40s. It played a huge role in preserving the unique east Donegal style of traditional music. In a border area, this provided a valuable vernacular reflection of the spirit of the labouring-class Catholic community members at the time.

The hall was in danger of tumbling down, which inspired the Kinny Cally Hall Restoration Project Group to conserve it.

Funding went towards a conservation report to halt the process of deterioration, and to investigate the potential of the building.



Historic Towns Initiative

The Historic Towns Initiative (HTI) is a joint undertaking by the Heritage Council and the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage which aims to promote the heritage-led regeneration of Ireland's historic towns. A new aspect of the HTI in 2022 was a call for proposals that encourage the specific re-use of historic buildings.

Budget 2022: €1.42m.

Progress: In 2022 funding was awarded to local authorities for seven conservation projects in:

- Listowel, Co. Kerry
- Ballyshannon, Co. Donegal
- Ballina, Co. Mayo
- Macroom, Co. Cork
- Tipperary town, Co. Tipperary
- Naas, Co. Kildare
- Monaghan town, Co. Monaghan

By year end, heritage-led regeneration projects were also completed in:

- Callan, Co. Kilkenny
- Wexford, Co. Wexford



2022 highlights: The Tipperary Glove Factory Project, situated in Tipperary town, provoked particular interest in 2022. The building originally operated as a premises for various commercial businesses (Charles Stewart Parnell is said to have given one of his most rousing speeches from one of the windows of the building.)

In the 1930s it became the Glove Factory and many locals lived there, some of whom are still alive today.

The building was in very poor condition before this project commenced. While the structure retained its historic character and significance as well as large parts of the historic fabric, a great deal of conservation works were required to stabilise, preserve and enhance the building.

The project benefited from €163,000 under the HTI in 2022 to undertake the necessary conservation works.

GLAS - Traditional Farm Buildings Grant Scheme

The GLAS (Green Low Carbon Agri Environment) Traditional Farm Buildings Grant scheme protects the ordinary buildings used in agriculture. Efforts focus on the retention, repair and reuse of existing materials not only for their heritage value but also for the inherent durability of many historic building materials.

The scheme is managed in partnership with the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine which funds the scheme.

Budget 2022: €1.25m

Progress: An evaluation of the scheme between 2016 and 2021 was carried out in 2022 by the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine and the Heritage Council, which established that well over a thousand wildlife habitats have been secured through the scheme and 522 buildings returned to functional use on the farm. The impact of the scheme on changing farmer attitudes was found to be impressive, extensively felt and likely to have a long-term effect. This report can be found [here](#).

2022 highlights: One of the most eye-catching projects in 2022 was one in Co. Meath which involved works on a stone paved surface in a traditional farm courtyard. The cobble material and granular base was arranged by the applicants with the laying of the cobbles carried out by conservation masonry contractors. Cobbles have been reinstated to original levels as evidenced on site which gives a pleasing natural undulated feel to the finished surface, original edging details retained where they were extant, and the original thin-stone edging detail retained where it was extant and replicated.

Heritage Stewardship Fund

The Heritage Stewardship Fund is a new stream of funding offered in 2022 to support the work of staff in state agencies and third-level institutions with responsibilities for heritage programmes, in particular, staff with responsibilities for stewardship of and access to collections, archives, buildings, monuments, and habitats. This grant scheme is intended to support staff in such organisations who have not always had access to Heritage Council or indeed wider funding and thus ensure the preservation of vulnerable heritage assets.

Budget 2022: €274,330.

Progress: The launch of this scheme is a significant step forward in our efforts to ensure the professional preservation of heritage objects which are vulnerable and at risk. Secondly, the scheme assists heritage specialists who play a key role in the heritage infrastructure of Ireland and are vital to the delivery of national policy and plans but who may be operating in organisations whose core remit may not be fully focused on heritage.

We are aware of the vulnerability of heritage collections, habitats and buildings across the country. This scheme seeks to provide support those charged with the stewardship of these assets to ensure their long-term preservation and accessibility.

2022 highlights: One interesting project in receipt of funding under the Heritage Stewardship Fund in 2022 was the ‘Record of Protected Structures; Reform and Reuse’ project.

The study reviewed the existing record of protected structures in the Kildare County


Development Plan 2017 – 2022 which involved recording each building of historic significance, recording the current condition, use and vacancy, with a view to highlighting areas and structures that can be targeted for future planning objectives. The expectation from this study was a list of vacant buildings which would be suitable for renovation for housing.

However, the outcome not only highlighted several vacant buildings suitable for residential units, but it also highlighted the injurious impact that some large-scale vacant buildings are having on the town. The lack of community spaces is evident and the loss of historic public spaces, such as the market square, dominated by car use. The study highlighted important areas requiring regeneration for the whole town.

The next step will be to address the recommendations generated from the study.

Their work on a Heritage Awareness Project resulted in the magnificent Village Heritage Trail, featuring a Rambling Looped Walk and a Biodiversity QR Coding Trail.

The Village Heritage Trail highlights the cultural and built heritage of Ballintubber, encompassing everything from a holy well and medieval castle, right into our more modern heritage in the form of local businesses upholding traditional practices and aesthetics.

The Looped Walk is a fantastic amenity for visitors and locals to enjoy the outdoors, while a Biodiversity QR Coding Trail makes great use of technology to showcase the wonders of Ballintubber's biodiversity.

The work done by Ballintubber Tidy Towns shows what can be achieved when different community groups pool resources and work together towards a common goal.

Lego Competition - Heritage At Play

Our annual 'Heritage At Play' competition invites children of primary school age to showcase an element of Irish heritage using LEGO bricks.

The 2022 competition opened for entries in December.

LEGO brick artist Jessica Farrell assisted with the difficult job of selecting the winners. She also provided some wonderful sample models with step-by-step instructions for the public to try. This year these included a pygmy shrew, a lapwing, and a button accordion.

Winning entries were showcased at a special exhibition at Kilkenny's Medieval Mile Museum which ran in early 2023. The exhibition concluded with an awards ceremony for the winners and runners-up in each category.

The Heritage Council partnered with the Technological University of the Shannon (TUS) to deliver the Fundamentals of Energy Renovation for Traditional Buildings course (FERTB) in 2022. The first module of the Level 8 Advanced Level Certificate was delivered from September to November 2022. The Heritage Council issued CPD Certificates of attendance to 42 participants at the end of November 2022. Participants had the option to progress to second module. The graduates from this course will be critical to ensuring that essential energy upgrades to historic buildings will be carried out in a manner sympathetic to architectural heritage.



Promoting Diversity and Inclusion

Coming to your natural senses

In 2019, the Heritage Council received funding from Creative Ireland to run a pilot programme of workshops focused on bringing a heightened experience and thus awareness of the natural environment to people with sight impairment. This project is called Coming to your Natural Senses.

The starting point for this project was that persons with significant sight impairment would have a better experience of our natural world if they were given some basic training on interpreting the sounds of biodiversity in and around their daily environment.

The highlight of 2022 came during National Biodiversity Week in May when our group was taken on a walk and talk event beginning at the North Bull Island Visitor Centre where Heritage Council Board Member Dr Mary Tubridy spoke about the botanical wonders associated with the internationally important dune system.

Andrew Lynch from BirdWatch Ireland then brought the class across by the mudflats to hear the waders and on to St Ann's Park woods, where participants listened for chiffchaffs and willow warblers.

Wildlife Sanctuary: working with persons seeking asylum

Wildlife Sanctuary is a Heritage Council project designed to facilitate a biodiversity workshop collaboration and cultural exchange between persons seeking asylum (PSA) and community conservation volunteers.

The project involves day trips to heritage sites throughout the year where the volunteers and PSA work together and exchange ideas about biodiversity.

Such is the demand from around the country to organise trips that the main focus of our work on this programme in 2022 was finding ways of expanding it but resourcing it accordingly to help meet some of the demand.

The Heritage Capacity Fund is a Heritage Council grant scheme which aims to build the capacity of non-governmental organisations, with a demonstrated national

relevance, working in the heritage sector by providing funding towards their core costs. The Heritage Council advised the Sanctuary in Nature and Heritage Group which runs the outings to apply for core funding under this scheme, and in 2023 they were successful in gaining funding. This will enable the project to grow and to include a larger number of PSA.

Outings this year included very successful trips to Lullymore in Co. Kildare and to the National Botanic Gardens.

Working with Pavee Point and the Traveller Community

The Heritage Council has continued to build its relationship with Pavee Point Traveller and Roma Centre over 2022. In addition to providing strategic advice on the long-term care and conservation of the wide-ranging collections of printed material, artworks and cultural heritage objects held by Pavee Point, the Heritage Council has been continuing the important work of developing a framework for greater support for Traveller and Roma heritage.


This work with Pavee Point is being done in parallel with engagement with representatives, groups and organisations from across the Traveller and Roma communities throughout Ireland and reflects the commitment of the Heritage Council to ensure long-term, strategic and sustainable supports are provided for Traveller Heritage.

Grant Schemes

Through its Community Heritage Grant Scheme, the Heritage Council actively encourages applications that focus on improved access to, and therefore participation in, heritage activities by people with disabilities. Applicants are referred to the National Disability Authority website to ensure projects follow best practice.

The Heritage Council is also particularly interested in projects that address the heritage of minority groups, new communities, and Traveller heritage.

Under the scheme in 2022, eighteen projects focusing on accessibility and diversity were awarded funding. Projects included improving access to historic buildings for people with mobility issues, installation of tactile exhibitions in museums to projects that focused on increasing awareness of Traveller culture and the heritage of LGBT communities. The total funding allocation was €226,639.



Reporting on Climate

Under the Public Sector Climate Action Mandate, public bodies are required to report annual energy data every year. The Heritage Council reports to the Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland (SEAI) and full results are included in the public sector energy efficiency performance report 2022.

In addition to fulfilling its responsibilities under the Public Sector Climate Action Mandate, the Heritage Council seeks to take direct action by implementing initiatives to reduce our carbon footprint and promote sustainable practices within our organisation. Through energy-efficient operations, waste management, and the adoption of sustainable business practices including green procurement, we strive to minimise our environmental impact and fulfil our responsibilities through the Sustainable Development Goals.

We also recognise the importance of our influence in the wider sphere. Collaborating with strategic partners, stakeholders, government agencies, and community groups, we advocate for sustainable heritage management and integrate climate considerations into all heritage programmes. By raising awareness and fostering partnerships, we aim to ensure that our rich built, cultural and natural heritage is conserved sustainably for future generations in the face of climate change.

To address climate impact on heritage, and to harness the potential of heritage to engage communities with sustainable development, we will continue to develop strategic programs that support research and innovative projects. These initiatives will enhance resilience and adaptability in the face of environmental changes. We will focus on knowledge sharing and capacity building, empowering heritage practitioners to incorporate climate considerations into their work and promote a more sustainable approach to heritage conservation.

Energy Conservation

Under Ireland's EU and national commitments and wider climate change goals, all public bodies are required to achieve a 51% reduction in energy-related greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions and a 50% improvement in energy efficiency by 2030.




Figure 1: Heritage Council progress to achieving energy efficiency, 2022.

Figure 1 shows the Heritage Council's annual progress on our energy performance indicator as calculated by SEAI, calculated as total energy use in kWh divided by floor area. The Heritage Council

has achieved 27.4% energy savings since our baseline year (2009) and our total energy consumption is down by 25.7% in that period. Following office closure for much of 2020 and 2021 due to COVID restrictions, our return to the office in 2022 and our growth as an organisation resulted in an increase of 61.7% in energy use. However, we are still on target to meet our required savings by 2030 and energy-saving projects in future years will deliver the required savings required by 2030.





Figure 2: Heritage Council energy consumption, 2022.

The Heritage Council's energy consumption in 2022 was 220,995 kWh (expressed as total primary energy requirement, as calculated by SEAI), an increase of 74% on 2021, and a decrease of 26% since the baseline year of 2009. This represents approximately 0.002% of the energy use of the public sector. The breakdown of use is shown in the chart below. Most of our energy use is gas for heating (68%), followed by electricity (32%) The small thermal renewable portion is contributed by solar power used for water heating (less than 1%).

The Heritage Council's energy-related CO₂ emissions in 2022 were 39,026 kg CO₂, an increase of 69.7% on 2021, primarily as a result of the return to office following COVID. The majority of this CO₂ came from gas with the remainder from electricity. As the Heritage Council does not operate a fleet, transport emissions are not reported through the SEAI system, although business transport is part of our emissions profile and will be examined in future years to make savings.

Reporting on Planning



The Heritage Council Planning Committee met on eight occasions during 2022.

The Heritage Council is a prescribed body in the planning process, as such a key element of the Planning Committee's activities was to commission a review this aspect of its work. This review was publicly tendered and following assessment planning consultants were appointed. A consultation process with local authorities, national government and non-governmental organisations took place and a draft report was completed by December 2022 with a view to finalising it in early 2023.

In relation to planning policy, two formal submissions were made to government. As part of the stakeholder consultation for the drafting of the new Planning and Development Bill the Council was asked for its views on the architectural heritage provisions of the existing Planning and Development Act 2000 as amended. Council completed its submission to the Planning Advisory Forum which included recommendations on the designations of Architectural Conservations Areas and the issuing of section 57 Declarations. Comments were also provided on the need to ensure appropriate expertise in all local authorities and on landscape heritage. The Committee commenced assessment of the emerging Planning and Development Bill in December 2022.

A submission was made to the Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage on Local Area Plans in 2022 under section 7 of the Heritage Act. This allows for formal policy submissions to be made to the Minister. This submission recommended that revised LAP guidelines

be issued which reflect the new Town Centres First policy, that there be greater use of Architectural Conservation Area and Protected Structure designations in historic town centres as well as a greater sense of time depth and heritage in the introduction to LAPS.

The Planning Committee also advised on the drafting of two planning submissions to An Bord Pleanála concerning a historic garden in Glounthane, Co. Cork, and an urban regeneration project at Dublin Street, Monaghan town.

Corporate Governance

The Heritage Council's policy is to maintain the highest standards of corporate governance in line with generally accepted policies and practices. The Council is committed to complying with the relevant provisions of the 2016 Code of Practice for the Governance of State Bodies. The Heritage Council has established an Audit, Risk and Finance Committee, which regularly reviews the system of internal control and engages external expertise in the carrying out of its functions, including the internal audit function, as appropriate. The Heritage Council is fully tax-compliant and does not engage in 'offensive' tax avoidance transactions.

Prompt Payments 2022

The Heritage Council is required to comply with the requirements of S.I. No. 580/2012 European Communities (Late Payment in Commercial Transactions) Regulations, 2012 and its predecessor, the Prompt Payments of Accounts Act 1997 (collectively known as the 'Regulations'). The Council's standard terms of credit taken, unless otherwise specified in contractual arrangements, are 30 days from the receipt of invoice. Procedures have been implemented which provide reasonable assurance against material non-compliance with the Regulations. While the procedures are designed to ensure compliance with the Regulations, they can only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance material non-compliance with the 1997 Act and S.I. No. 580/2012.

A review of all payments made during the year ended 31 December 2022 shows 7 payments totalling €8,318 giving rise to an interest penalty of €424 under the above regulations.

With effect from 1 July 2011, the Heritage Council was required to comply with government Decisions S29296 in relation to the 15-day prompt payment rule. The disclosures required in the Memorandum of Government (MoG) supporting the above decisions for the period 1 January 2022 to 31 December 2022 are detailed in the table on the following page.

Board Membership

As of 31 December 2022, the board had seven (70%) female and three (30%) male members, with one position vacant. On the 28 March 2023 the Minister filled the one remaining vacancy with the appointment of Mr Mark Scott as a board member.

Following this appointment, the board has seven (64%) female and four (36%) male members. As such the Heritage Council has not achieved the Government target of a minimum of 40% representation for each gender on state boards. The Heritage Council will continue to work with its parent department to ensure that these targets are met as future appointments are made to the board of the Heritage Council.

Governance Statement and Council Members' Report

The Heritage Council was established under the Heritage Act 1995. The functions of the Council are set out in section 6 of this Act. The Council is accountable to the Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage and is responsible for ensuring good governance and performs this task by setting strategic objectives and targets and taking strategic decisions on all key business issues. The regular day-to-day management, control and direction of The Heritage Council are the responsibility of the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) and the senior management team. The CEO and the senior management team must follow the broad strategic direction set by the Council, and must ensure that all Council members have a clear understanding of the key activities and decisions related to the entity, and of any significant risks likely to arise. The CEO acts as a direct liaison between the Council and the management of The Heritage Council.

Council Responsibilities

The work and responsibilities of the Council are set out in the Standing Orders and Reserved Functions, which also contain the matters specifically reserved for Council decision. Standing items considered by the Council include:

- declaration of interests,
- reports from committees,
- financial reports,
- management accounts and,
- reserved matters.

Section 21 of the Heritage Act requires the Council of The Heritage Council to keep, in such form as may be approved by the Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage with consent of the Minister for Public Expenditure and Reform, all proper and usual accounts of money received and expended by it.

In preparing these financial statements, the Council of the Heritage Council is required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently,
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that it will continue in operation and,
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements.

The Council is responsible for keeping adequate accounting records which disclose, with reasonable accuracy at any time, its financial position and enables it to ensure that the financial statements comply with S.21 of the Heritage Act 1995. The maintenance and integrity of the corporate and financial information on The Heritage Council's website is the responsibility of the Council.

The Council is responsible for approving the annual plan and budget.

The Council is also responsible for safeguarding its assets and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The Council considers that the financial statements of The Heritage Council give a true and fair view of the financial performance and the financial position of The Heritage Council at 31st December 2022.

Council Structure

The Council consists of a chairperson and up to ten ordinary members all of whom were appointed by the Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage. Council Structure contd.

The Council has established five committees as follows:

1. The Audit, Risk & Finance Committee (ARFC) comprises three Council members and one external member. The meetings are also attended by the Chairperson of the Council. The role of the ARFC is to support the Council in relation to its responsibilities for issues of risk, control and governance and associated assurance. The ARFC is independent from the financial management of the organisation. In particular the Committee ensures that the internal control systems including audit activities are monitored actively and independently. The ARFC reports to the Council after each meeting. Michael Farrell was appointed as the Chairperson of the ARFC on the 11th November 2021. Other members of the ARFC are John Patrick Greene, Patricia O'Hare and Phil Walsh (external member) who was appointed on 15th January 2021. The Chairperson attend the ARFC meetings.
2. The Strategy Committee comprised six Council members. The meetings were also attended by the Chairperson of the Council when the Chairperson is available. The role of the Strategy Committee was to advise Council on the development of a new strategic plan. The Committee reported to the Council after each meeting. The Committee completed it work during 2022, with the last meeting of the Strategy Committee taken place on 6th May 2022. The members of the Strategy Committee were Sheila Pratschke (Chairperson), Martina Maloney, John G Pierce, Sammy Leslie, Mary Tubridy and Patricia O'Hare.
3. On 15th January 2021 the Council established the *National Biodiversity Data Centre (NBDC)* Task Force. The Taskforce achieved its objective when the National Biodiversity Data Centre was formed as a company limited by guarantee (NBDC CLG) on the 5th December 2022. The last meeting of the Taskforce was held on the 1st December 2022. The members of the task force were Geraldine Tallon (Chairperson), Martina Maloney, Michael Farrell, John Patrick Greene, Donald Hobern, Daniel Sinnott and Andy Bleasdale.
4. On the 6th August, 2021 the Council established a Planning Committee. The role of the Committee is to advise on the use of Council's status as a prescribed body under the Planning and Development Regulations. The Committee reports to Council after each meeting. The members of the Committee are Fionnuala May (Chairperson), Deirdre McDermot, Sammy Leslie, Mary Tubridy and Rachel Kenny.
5. On the 11th November 2021 the Council established the Cultural Heritage Restitution and Decolonisation Committee (working title). The role of the Committee is to draft and agree a national policy on the restitution and decolonisation of cultural heritage in Ireland that has been illegally or unethically elicited or traded. The Chair of the Committee has not been appointed yet. Council representation on the Committee is John Patrick Greene and Patricia O'Hare. No meetings of this Committee were held in 2022. Full membership of this Committee is yet to be defined.


Gender Balance, Diversity and Inclusion

The Council has complied with the requirements of the Code of Practice for the Governance of State Bodies, as published by the Department of Public Expenditure and Reform in August 2016 and its Annex published in 2020.

Statement On Internal Control

Scope of Responsibility

On behalf of The Heritage Council, I acknowledge the Council's responsibility for ensuring that an effective system of internal control is maintained and operated. This responsibility takes account of the requirements of the Code of Practice for the Governance of State Bodies (2016).

Purpose of the System of Internal Control

The system of internal control is designed to manage risk to a tolerable level rather than to eliminate it. The system can therefore only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance that assets are safeguarded, transactions authorised and properly recorded, and that material errors or irregularities are either prevented or detected in a timely way.

The system of internal control, which accords with guidance issued by the Department of Public Expenditure and Reform, has been in place in The Heritage Council for the year ended 31 December 2022 and up to the date of approval of the financial statements.

Capacity to Handle Risk

The Heritage Council has an Audit, Risk & Finance Committee (ARFC) comprising three Council members, one of whom is the Chairperson, and one external member with financial and audit expertise. The ARFC met 6 times in 2022.

The Heritage Council has also appointed external consultants to carry out the internal audit function which is adequately resourced and conducts a programme of work agreed with the ARFC.

The ARFC has developed a risk management policy which sets out its risk appetite, the risk management processes in place and details the roles and responsibilities of staff in relation to risk. This Risk Management Policy & Operational Framework were reviewed and approved by the Council on 30th March 2023.

Risk and Control Framework

The Heritage Council has implemented a risk management system which identifies and reports key risks and the management actions being taken to address and, to the extent possible, to mitigate those risks.

A risk register is in place which identifies the key risks facing The Heritage Council and these have been identified, evaluated and graded according to their significance. The register is reviewed and updated by the ARFC on a bi-annual basis. The outcome of these assessments is used to plan and allocate resources to ensure risks are managed to an acceptable level. The Council reviewed and approved the Risk Register on 29th March 2022 and 24th November 2022.

The risk register details the controls and actions needed to mitigate risks and the responsibility for operation of controls assigned to specific staff. I confirm that a control environment containing the following elements is in place:

Risk and Control Framework contd.

- procedures for all key business processes have been documented,
- financial responsibilities have been assigned at management level with corresponding accountability,
- there is an appropriate budgeting system with an annual budget, which is kept under review by senior management,
- there are systems aimed at ensuring the security of information and communications technology systems,
- there are systems in place to safeguard the assets, and
- control procedures over grant funding to outside agencies ensure the adequate control over approval of grants and monitoring and review of grantees to ensure grant funding has been applied for the purpose intended.

Ongoing Monitoring and Review

Formal procedures have been established for monitoring control processes, and control deficiencies are communicated to those responsible for taking corrective action and to management and the Council, where relevant, in a timely way. I confirm the following ongoing monitoring systems are in place:

- key risks and related controls have been identified, and processes have been put in place to monitor the operation of those key controls and report any identified deficiencies,
- reporting arrangements have been established at all levels where responsibility for financial management has been assigned, and
- there are regular reviews by senior management of periodic and annual performance and financial reports which indicate performance against budgets.

Procurement

I confirm that The Heritage Council has procedures in place to ensure compliance with current procurement rules and guidelines.

Review of Effectiveness

I confirm that The Heritage Council has procedures to monitor the effectiveness of its risk management and control procedures. The Heritage Council's monitoring and review of the effectiveness of the system of internal control is informed by the work of the internal and external auditors, the ARFC which oversees their work, and the senior management within The Heritage Council responsible for the development and maintenance of the internal control framework.

Statement On Internal Control contd.

Review of Effectiveness contd.

I confirm that the Council conducted an annual review of the effectiveness of the internal controls for 2022 on the 30th March 2023 which consisted of a Review of Internal Financial Controls and Internal Control Questionnaire.

Internal and External Audit

The Heritage Council has outsourced its internal audit function which is adequately resourced and conducts a risk-based programme of work agreed with the ARFC Committee. Internal Audit is responsible to the AFRC for providing independent and objective evaluation of risk management, control and governance processes within the Heritage Council. Internal Audit examines the adequacy, efficiency and effectiveness of systems, people, and processes to identify potential risks and areas for improvement. During 2022, two operational audits and one review of internal controls were completed by the Internal Auditor who reported their findings and recommendations to the AFRC.

These were as follows:

- Grants Management - No high priority, three medium priority and four low priority findings and recommendations.
- IT Disaster Recovery - No high priority, one medium priority and four low priority findings and recommendations.
- System of Internal Control (SIC) Review - No high priority, no medium priority and five low priority findings and recommendations.

During 2022, the Comptroller and Auditor General reported to the AFRC on any findings and observations from their examination of business and financial processes as part of the external audit of the 2021 Financial Statements.

The implementation of outstanding audit recommendations is reviewed by ARFC at each meeting. This review includes updates on actions taken to implement outstanding recommendations and updates on implementation timelines.

At the time of signing the Financial Statements there were no “High Priority” weaknesses identified by the prior year audit conducted by the Comptroller and Auditor General and internal audits conducted during 2022.


Procurement

The Heritage Council was substantially compliant with procurement guidelines. A review of 2022 expenditure to suppliers was carried out by the Executive and presented to the Audit, Risk and Finance Committee in March 2023. This review did not identify any expenditure that was incurred in relation to goods and services where the procedures employed did not comply with procurement guidelines.

Compliance with public procurement guidelines is a high priority of the Board. There has been significant progress in this area over the last number of years and robust policies and procedures have been introduced and implemented. This area will continue to be monitored closely and action taken to address areas where non-compliance has been identified.

Opinion on the financial statements

Responsibilities of Board members

As detailed in the governance statement and Board members' report, the Board members are responsible for

- the preparation of annual financial statements in the form prescribed under section 21 of the Heritage Act 1995
- ensuring that the financial statements give a true and fair view in accordance with FRS 102
- ensuring the regularity of transactions
- assessing whether the use of the going concern basis of accounting is appropriate, and
- such internal control as they determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Responsibilities of the Comptroller and Auditor General

I am required under section 21 of the Heritage Act 1995 to audit the financial statements of the Heritage Council and to report thereon to the Houses of the Oireachtas.

My objective in carrying out the audit is to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement due to fraud or error. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with the ISAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with the ISAs, I exercise professional judgment and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. In doing so,

- I identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements whether due to fraud or error; design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks; and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.

My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Heritage Council to cease to continue as a going concern.
- I evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

I communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I identify during my audit.

I report by exception if, in my opinion,

- I have not received all the information and explanations I required for my audit, or
- the accounting records were not sufficient to permit the financial statements to be readily and properly audited, or
- the financial statements are not in agreement with the accounting records.

Information other than the financial statements

My opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information presented with those statements, and I do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with my audit of the financial statements, I am required under the ISAs to read the other information presented and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or with knowledge obtained during the audit, or if it otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work I have performed, I conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, I am required to report that fact.

Reporting on other matters

My audit is conducted by reference to the special considerations which attach to State bodies in relation to their management and operation. I report if I identify any material matters relating to the manner in which public business has been conducted.

I seek to obtain evidence about the regularity of financial transactions in the course of audit. I report if I identify any material instance where public money has not been applied for the purposes intended or where transactions did not conform to the authorities governing them.



Notes To The Financial Statements For The Year Ended 31 December 2022

Note 1. Accounting Policies

The basis of accounting and significant accounting policies adopted by The Heritage Council are set out below. They have all been applied consistently throughout the year and for the preceding year.

a) General Information

The Heritage Council was set up under the Heritage Act 1995, with a head office at Áras na hOidreachta, Church Lane, Kilkenny. The Heritage Council's primary objectives as set out in Section 6 of The Heritage Act 1995 are as follows: to propose policies and priorities for the identification, protection, preservation and enhancement of the national heritage and to promote its appreciation.

b) Statement of Compliance

The financial statements of The Heritage Council for the year ended 31st December 2022 have been prepared in compliance with the applicable legislation, and with FRS 102, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland issued by the Financial Reporting Council in the UK.

c) Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are prepared on the going concern basis, under the historical cost convention, except for certain assets and liabilities as explained in the accounting policies below. The financial statements are in the form approved by the Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage with the concurrence of the Minister for Public Expenditure and Reform under The Heritage Act, 1995. The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to The Heritage Council's financial statements.

d) Revenue

Oireachtas Grants

Revenue is generally recognised on an accruals basis; one exception to this is in the case of Oireachtas Grants which are recognised on a cash receipts basis.

Other Revenue

Other revenue is recognised on an accruals basis.

e) Grant Payments

The Heritage Council offers grants to various bodies and individuals to carry out works under its heritage grant schemes. When a grantee accepts the terms and conditions of a grant offer from Council, Council enters into a commitment with that grantee. That commitment is recognised as an accrual only when the grantee is seen to have fulfilled the full terms and conditions of the grant offer. Details of grant commitments at 31st December 2022 are given in note 17.

f) Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation, adjusted for any provision for impairment. Depreciation is provided on all property, plant and

equipment, other than freehold land and artwork, at rates estimated to write off the cost less the estimated residual value of each asset on a straight-line basis over their estimated useful lives as follows:

Buildings	2.5%	Plant & Equipment	10%-20%

Residual value represents the estimated amount which would currently be obtained from disposal of an asset, after deducting estimated costs of disposal, if the asset were already of an age and in the condition expected at the end of its useful life.

If there is objective evidence of impairment of the value of an asset, an impairment loss is recognised in the Statement of Income and Expenditure and Retained Reserves in the year.

g) Capital Account

The capital account comprises income allocated for the purchase of fixed assets. It is amortised in line with the depreciation of the related assets.

h) Leasing

Assets acquired under finance leases are capitalised and included in property, plant and equipment and depreciated in accordance with the Council policy.

i) Employee Benefits

Short-term Benefits

Short term benefits such as holiday pay are recognised as an expense in the year, and benefits that are accrued at year-end are included in the Payables figure in the Statement of Financial Position.

Retirement Benefits

The Heritage Council previously established its own defined benefit pension scheme, funded annually on a pay-as-you-go basis from monies provided by the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage and from contributions deducted from staff and members' salaries.

The Heritage Council also operates the Single Public Services Pensions Scheme ("Single Scheme"), which is a defined benefit scheme for pensionable public servants appointed on or after 1st January 2013. Single Scheme members' contributions are paid over to the Department of Public Expenditure and Reform (DPER).

Pension costs reflect pension benefits earned by employees and are shown net of staff pension contributions which are retained by The Heritage Council. An amount corresponding to the pension charge is recognised as income to the extent that it is recoverable, and offset by grants received in the year to discharge pension payments. Actuarial gains or losses arising on scheme liabilities are reflected in the Statement of Comprehensive Income, and

Notes To The Financial Statements For The Year Ended 31 December 2022 contd.

i) Employee Benefits contd.

a corresponding adjustment is recognised in the amount recoverable from the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage.

The financial statements reflect, at fair value, the assets and liabilities arising from The Heritage Council's pension obligations and any related funding and recognises the costs of providing pension benefits in the accounting periods in which they are earned by employees. Retirement benefit scheme liabilities are measured on an actuarial basis using the projected unit credit method.

j) Critical Accounting Judgements and Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported for assets and liabilities as at the reporting date and the amounts reported for revenues and expenses during the year. However, the nature of estimation means that the actual outcomes could differ from those estimates. The following judgements have the most significant effect on amounts recognised in the financial statements.

Impairment of Property, Plant and Equipment

Assets that are subject to amortisation are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less cost to sell and value in use. For the purpose of assessing impairment, assets are grouped at the lowest levels for which there are separately identifiable cash flows (cash generating units). Non-financial assets that suffered impairment are reviewed for possible reversal of the impairment at each reporting date.

Depreciation and Residual Values

The Council have reviewed the asset lives and associated residual values of all fixed asset classes, and in particular, the useful economic life and residual values of fixtures and fittings, and have concluded that asset lives and residual values are appropriate.

Retirement Benefit Obligation

The assumptions underlying the actuarial valuations for which the amounts recognised in the financial statements are determined (including discount rates, rate of inflation, rates of increase in future compensation levels, mortality rates and retirement age) are updated annually based on current economic conditions and for any relevant changes to the terms and conditions of the pension and post-retirement plans.

The assumptions can be affected by:

- (i) the discount rate, changes in the rate of return on high quality corporate bonds;
- (ii) future compensation levels, future labour market conditions; and
- (iii) mortality rates and age of retirement.

(e) General Description Of The Scheme

The retirement benefit scheme is a defined benefit final salary pension arrangement with benefits and contributions defined by reference to current “model” public sector scheme regulations. The scheme provides a pension (1/80 per year of service), a gratuity or lump sum (3/80 per year of service) and spouse’s and children’s pensions. Normal Retirement Age is a member’s 65th birthday, and pre 2004 members have an entitlement to retire without actuarial reduction from age 60. Pensions in payment (and deferment) normally increase in line with general public sector salary inflation.

The disclosures below have been prepared for the Heritage Council in relation to benefits payable from the Heritage Council Employee Superannuation Scheme 2003 and Spouses and Children’s Scheme. The schemes are un-funded of the defined benefit type, providing retirement benefits based on service and pensionable salary. The valuation used for FRS 102 disclosures have been based on a full assessment of the liabilities of the Schemes as at 31st December 2022. “B’fhéidir go bhfuil d’ocras a bhaineann i gcónaí gníomhach agus dian toisc gur bhain tú chomh hiomlán sular tháinig tú anseo. Is macalla agus aisfhuaimniú d’oidhreachta dofheicthe é an t-ocras seo maidir le muintearas.”

Nuir a bhí machnamh á dhéanamh ar an mbliaín díreach caite, tháinig na focail seo ón bhfealsamh agus caomhnóir mór Éireannach ar ár n-oidhreacht, John O Donohue, chun cuimhne arís agus arís eile.

Ní dóigh linn i gcónaí go bhfuil an oidhreacht dofheicthe. I ndeireadh na dála, is féidir linn áilleacht nádúrtha ár dtírdhreacha a fheiceáil go soiléir, na scéalta a chloisteáil go soiléir a chuireann oideachas orainn faoin am atá caite agus ar féidir leo teagmháil a dhéanamh leis an oidhreacht thógtha a thóig ár sinsir. Is é an rud atá dofheicthe, áfach, ná an chaoi a mbraitheann na heispéisír seo orainn, an muintearas a thugann siad dúinn. Sa Chomhairle Oidhreachta, is é an post atá againn gan an mothúchán sin a thabhairt

do dhaoine. Is é an post atá againn ná éascaíocht a dhéanamh do na daoine atá in ann, agus tá bród orm a rá gur post é seo a rinne muid go han-mhaith anuraidh.

In 2022, fuair an Chomhairle Oidhreachta an buiséad is mó ó 2009 de €13.8M. Leis an leibhéal méadaithe maoinithe seo, thacaíomar le níos mó cleachtóirí oidhreachta, údarás áitiúla, grúpaí pobail agus eagraíochtaí oidhreachta ná riamh inár stair 28 mbliana. Mhéadaigh an maioniú a d'eisíomar trí dheontais 13% go €6.6M, mhéadaigh tacaíocht do bhonnieagar oidhreachta 15% go €2.6M, agus mhéadaigh maioniú dár gcláir straitéisearcha 35% go €1.6M.

Ní fhéadfaimis a bheith ag soláthar dár n-earnáil ar an mbealach seo murach tacaíocht leanúnach an Aire Darragh O'Brien TD, an tAire Tithíochta, Rialtais Áitiúil agus Oidhreachta, an tAire Stáit Malcolm Noonan TD, an tAire Stáit Oidhreachta agus Athchóirithe Toghcháin, agus comhghleacaithe eile sa (DHLGH). Ba mhaith liom an deis seo a thapú chun buíochas a ghabháil leo agus táim ag súil go mór le bheith ag comhoibriú leo arís in 2023.

De réir mar a leanann an eagraíocht ag aibiú, beidh an fhís sin aici freisin, agus bhí 2022 in go leor bealaí ag aistriú don fhís sin. Thug sé le fios go raibh deireadh leis an bplean straitéiseach a bhí againn roimhe seo, 'Oidhreacht i Lár Báire', áit a raibh sé ar cheann de na spriocanna ardleibhéal 'mothú muintearais a chothú inár ndaoine trína bhfíniúlacht agus a n-áit a fheabhsú'.

Agus mé ag iarraidh a thomhas ar éirigh linn an sprioc sin a bhaint amach, thosaigh mé ag machnamh ar na daoine agus ar na grúpaí ar bhual mé leo in 2022. Smaoinigh mé ar Líonra iontach Chartlanna Pobail na hÉireann (iCAN), tionscnamh oidhreachta pobail arna chomhordú ag Ard-Mhúsaem na hÉireann i gcomhar leis an gComhairle Oidhreachta agus le húdaráis áitiúla, ag spreagadh agus ag tacú le pobail chun a stair agus a n-oidhreacht áitiúil a bhailíú agus a roinnt ar líne.

I mí lúil na bliana seo caite, d'óstáil iCAN comhdháil an Ghrúpa Cartlainne Pobail agus Oidhreachta i nGaillimh agus mar Chathaoirleach ar an gComhairle Oidhreachta, ba mhór an onóir dom labhairt

leis an lucht freastail. Níos tábhactaí fós, bhí an deis agam bualadh leis na hoibrithe deonacha agus leis na staraithe áitiúla a bhíonn ar chostas mór go minic, faisnéis luachmhar a chosaint le luach ollmhór acadúil, stairiúil agus mothúchánach. A bhúi lenár maoiniú méadaithe, bhí an Chomhairle Oidhreachta in ann gealltanás a thabhairt in 2022 maoiniú a thabhairt do leathnú an tionscnaimh agus na fairne iCAN, rud a d'éascódh dóibh siúd a chabhraíonn lenár n-oidhreacht dhofheicthe a nochtadh dúinn.

Bliain a bhí ann freisin nuair a thosaigh muid ag breathnú i dtreo na todhchaí. Seoladh ár bplean nua cúig bliana, [Ár n-Áit sa Stair](#), a dréachtaíodh in 2022 faoi mhaoirseacht shaineolach mo chomhchomhalta den Chomhairle, Sheila Pratschke, [go hoifigiúil imí Feabhra 2023](#). Is straitéis í a fhéachann le raon feidhme ár réimse tionchair a leathnú agus aithníonn sé grúpaí nach mbeadh sé chomh simplí sin rúndiamhra a n-oidhreachta dofheicthe a nochtadh.

I staidéar eitneagrafach ar Thaistealaithe óga a rinne Sindy Joyce in 2018, labhraíodh faoi fheiniméan tragóideach taistealaithe 'i bhfolach i radharc soiléir'. Is é sin le rá, a bhféiniúlacht a cheilt nó a chlóbhualadh ar eagla go ndéanfaí idirdhealú nó stiogmatú orthu. Go mbraitheadh duine ar bith go mbeadh sé d'fhiacha air nó uirthi a oidhreacht a chur faoi chois ar an mbealach seo agus go bhfuil sé mar aidhm ag ár straitéis nua é a chur ina cheart. Táimid tiomanta do Straitéis Oidhreachta Taistealaí a phorbairt i gcomhpháirtíocht leis an bpobal.

Tá áthas orm a rá gur cuireadh túis leis an

obair air seo cheana féin in 2022 trí shraith plé le hlonad Taistealaithe agus Romaigh Pavée Point agus le Gluaiseacht Taistealaithe na hÉireann faoin gcaoí ar féidir linn oibriú le chéile chun tacú le cosaint ár n-oidhreachta do Thaistealaithe.

Agus muid ag caint ar uileghabhála agus grúpaí mionlacha, bhí áthas orainn béis i bhfad níos láidre a chur ar an nGaeilge anuraidh. Glicitar leis nach féidir i ndáiríre caint ar oidhreacht na tíre seo gan trácht a dhéanamh ar an nGaeilge agus b'shin an fáth go raibh líofacht sa teanga mar chuid de na riachtainais is tábhactaí agus muid ag earcú i 2022, an fáth go ndearna muid don chéad uair, aistriúchán go Gaeilge ar ár suíomhanna gréasáin ar fad, an fáth go ndearna muid iarracht ar leith grúpaí Gaeltachta a chur ar an eolas faoi [na scéim deontais](#) atá againn, agus an fáth go bhfuil tagairt ar leith ar ár tiomantas don Ghaeilge sa stráitéis.

Nuir a labhraímid faoin gguardach muintearas, ní bhíonn féile ar bith a chuireann bunús níos mó orm gach bliain ná ár gclár suaitheanta, Seachtain Náisiúnta na hOidhreachta. Gach bliain, cuireann na mílte imeachtaí de chuid Sheachtain Náisiúnta na hOidhreachta i mí Lúnasa ar ár gcumas ceiliúradh ar fud na tíre ar ár n-oidhreacht, agus gheallamar os cionn €510,000 in 2022 chun rathúlacht ceann de na fíelte cultúrtha is mó in Éirinn a chinntíú.

Déanaim iarracht freastal ar an oiread imeachtaí agus is féidir liom gach bliain agus fágtar mé i gcónaí ag iarraidh níos mó. Tá ionadh orm go seasta ag na bealaí airgtheacha a n-éiríonn le daoine scéalta ón am atá thart a insint a chiallaíonn rud éigin do dhaoine inniu. Ócáid amháin a bhain go han-mhaith leis in 2022 ná [Siopa Carthanachta](#).

[Cathaoireacha Rothaí na hÉireann i Leitir Ceanainn](#) a bhailigh seanearraí as Dún na nGall. Ar leithligh, bhailigh siad seanscéalta as Leitir Ceanainn agus ansin péireáil siad suas gach mír le scéal. Cuireadh clib ar na scéalta agus tugadh cuireadh do chuairteoirí chuig an siopa brabhsáil tríothu chun foghlaim faoi iar-áitritheoirí a gcontae.

Táimid meáite ar an tSeachtain Náisiúnta na hOidhreachta a fhás laistigh de shaolré na straitéise nua agus na himeachtaí seo a thabhairt chuig réimse chomh leathan daoine agus is féidir. I dtreo dheireadh 2022, cheap an Chomhairle Oidhreachta Ronan Healy, ár gcéad Bhainisteoir Cláir don tSeachtain Náisiúnta na hOidhreachta inmheánach. Is forbairt thar a bheith dearfach í seo agus is cinnte go gcabhróidh sé leis an sprioc seo a bhaint amach.

Ba mhaith liom buíochas a ghabháil le mo chomhghleacaithe ar bhord na Comhairle Oidhreachta as an gcúnamh a thugann siad agus as an méid a dhéanann siad i gcáil dheonach chun oidhreacht na hÉireann a chosaint. Ba mhaith liom aitheantas a thabhairt freisin don obair iontach atá déanta ag Príomhfheidhmeannach agus foireann na Comhairle Oidhreachta a oibríonn go dian chun sainordú na Comhairle a chomhlíonadh agus táim ag tnúth le bheith ag obair le foireann leathnaithe na Comhairle Oidhreachta sna blianta amach romhainn.

Teachtaireacht ónár bPríomhfheidhmeannach

Is éard atá i gceist lenár gcuid oibre ó lá go lá sa Chomhairle Oidhreachta ná athrú leanúnach airde idir na trí cholún oidhreachta; nádúrtha, tógha agus cultúrtha. Nó b'fhéidir go mbeadh sé níos cruinne a rá go bhfuil go leor iltascáil ag imirt. Ach in aon bhliain ar leith, ar chúis ar bith, d'fhéadfadh níos mó fócais a bheith ag teastáil ó cheann de na colúin seo ná na cinn eile.

Agus athbhreithniú á dhéanamh agam ar 2022 ón bpointe loitiméireachta seo, is é an rud a sheasann amach domsa ná na héachtaí a rinneadh i dtéarmaí ár n-oidhreachta nádúrtha agus ár mbithéagsúlachta i mbliain inar sainmhíníodh an oiread sin dár gcuid oibre mar gheall ar na dúshláin a bhaineann le hathrú aeráide agus cailliúint na bithéagsúlachta.

Socraíodh an ton ag túis na bliana nuair a sheol an tAire Stáit Oidhreachta Malcolm Noonan *Oidhreacht Éireann 2030*, ag cur síos ar an athrú aeráide agus ar an mbithéagsúlachta mar “phríomhfhócas” an phlean, agus dúirt sé “go léiríonn na gníomhartha sa straitéis na dúshláin ollmhóra atá roimh oidhreacht na hÉireann, go háirithe maidir le cailliúint an dúlra agus na bithéagsúlachta.”

Idir an dá linn, fógraíodh bithéagsúlacht agus oidhreacht inbhuanaithe mar phríomhthréamaí don tSeachtain Náisiúnta na hOidhreachta in 2022, ag réiteach an bhealaigh do roinnt imeachtaí áille agus nuálacha ar na hábhair seo.

Sa chomhthéacs sin, ba mhór an sásamh é a bheith in ann ár gclár nua d'oifigigh bithéagsúlachta a fhógairt go foirmiúil in 2022, clár ina mbeidh oifigeach bithéagsúlachta tiomnaithe ceaptha ar gach údarás áitiúil sa tir faoi dheireadh 2024. Tharla an fógra anuraidh nuair a ceapadh an chéad Cheannasaí Oidhreachta agus Athrú Aeráide de chuid na Comhairle Oidhreachta, Catherine Casey, a bheidh linn tar éis beagnach 20 bliain d'obair eiseamláireach mar Oifigeach Oidhreachta Laoise agus a dhéanfaidh maoirseacht ar an gclár, i measc go leor feidhmeanna eile.

Agus an réamhrá seo á scríobh agam ag túis an tsamhraidh 2023, [tá dhá oifigeach bithéagsúlachta](#) déag tar éis túis a chur leis an obair thábhachtach seo cheana féin, rud a chuirfidh ar chumas na gcomhairí contae leas a bhaint as saineolas oifigigh bithéagsúlachta ina chinnteoireacht.

Cé nach bhfuil sé tarraingteach riamh chun plé a dhéanamh ar an ngá atá le struchtúir dea-rialachais, tá sé an-tábhachtach mar sin féin. I mí na Nollag 2022, chonaiceamar gur tugadh próiseas fada casta chun críche a raibh athstruchtúrú an Ionaid Náisiúnta le Sonraí Bithéagsúlachta (NBDC) mar chuideachta faoi theorainn ráthaíochta (CLG) mar thoradh air; a bhféadfadh tionchar mór a bheith aige ar an gcaoi a mbailímid agus a mbainistímid bithéagsúlacht sa tír seo. Cinnteoidh an struchtúr nua seo cosaint fhadtéarmach na seirbhísé tábhactaí seo, rud a chuirfidh muinín athnuaithe ar fáil d'fhoireann an NBDC agus don phobal.

Bhí an NBDC ag feidhmiú mar chonradh le haghaidh seirbhísé. Is é an rud a chiallaíonn sé seo i dtéarmaí gnáthdhuiine ná nach bhféadfadh an eagraíocht dul i mbun pleánála fadtéarmaí, nach bhféadfadh sí a bheith cinnte d'acmhainní ilbhliantúla, go raibh srian ar a cumas maoiniú a lorg ó fhoinsí eile agus nach raibh bord i bhfeidhm aici chun maoirseacht shaineolach a chur ar fáil. Cuireann an t-aistriú chuig CLG in 2022 deireadh leis na constaicí sin agus is bua mór é don bhithéagsúlacht in Éirinn.

Ar ndóigh, is mór an sásamh é tionscadail mar seo a thabhairt ón gcoimpeart go dtí an dúnadh, agus cosúil le haon tionscadal ar fiú é a bhaint amach, tógann sé am, acmhainní agus foighne. Ach i measc an bhrú laethúil spriocdhátaí, spriocanna, cruinnithe agus oibleagáidí, is dóigh liom go bhfuil sé thar a bheith tábhachtach am a dhéanamh le haghaidh idirphlé, le haghaidh machnaimh agus chun smaointe a mhalartú.

Sin an fáth go raibh an Chomhdháil Náisiúnta Bithéagsúlachta i gCaisleán Bhaile Átha Cliath i mí an Mheithimh ar cheann de bhuaicphointí na bliana seo caite, agus de réir mar a scríobhaim, meabhraítéar dom anois na daoine iontacha ar bhual mé leo agus na teachtaireachtaí spreagúla a thug siad.

D'óstáil an Chomhairle Oidhreachta seisiún le linn na comhdhála inar thug an Dr Aoibhinn Ní Shuilleabháin, ansin ag tú a turais mar Chathaoirleach ar an Tionól Saoránach ar Chailliúint na Bithéagsúlachta, (a ndearna an Chomhairle Oidhreachta aighneacht ina leith in 2022) forléargas iontach ar an gcaoi a n-oibríonn an tionól saoránach, ag tabhairt léargas corraitheach ar chumhacht agus ar thrédhearcacht ár ndaonlathais.

Chuaigh focail an Dr Brendan Dunford, comhbhunaitheoir lontaobhas Burrenbeo (Carthanás a fhaigheann Maoliniú ón gComhairle Oidhreachta go minic) i bhfeidhm orm freisin, a dúirt:

“Nuair a bhíonn an póca, an ceann agus an croí ag obair as lámha a chéile, is é sin nuair a tharlaíonn rudaí draíochta agus tosaíonn muid ag féachaint ar phobal a bheith ina maoir agus ina gcaomhnóirí ar oidhreacht a n-áite féin.”

Teachtaireacht shimplí ach chumhachtach a bhí ann, agus teachtaireacht a chuaigh go mór i bhfeidhm orm féin agus ar obair na Comhairle Oidhreachta. Chomh maith le mo chomhghleacaithe, déanaimid ár ndícheall a chinntíú go mbíonn acmhainní airgeadais, eolas agus fonn i gcónaí i láthair.

Nuair a ceapadh mé mar POF in 2019, b'ionann caiteachas bliantúil na Comhairle Oidhreachta agus €8M; in 2022 tá €13.8M ar a mhéid bainte amach aige, agus tá sé tábhachtach aitheantas a thabhairt don chaoi ar chuir an méadú maoinithe seo ar chumas na Comhairle Oidhreachta ár n-earnáil a neartú agus tacú léi.

Fuair ár 11 clár a fuair maoiniú straitéiseach os cionn €4M in 2022 agus bronnadh €1.5Mm ar na céadta grúpa oidhreachta pobail agus deonacha chun tionscadail oidhreachta a chur i gcrích. Ina theannta sin, d'éascaigh an €510,000 a chuaigh i dtreo na Seachtaine Náisiúnta na hOidhreachta beagnach 2,000 imeacht le 920 eagraí a thug deis do na mílte duine an leas is fearr a bhaint as an méid atá le tairiscint ag oidhreacht na hÉireann. Thacaigh ár gCiste Acmhainne Oidhreachta le 28 eagraíocht atá dírithe ar an oidhreacht, amhail Comhairle Caomhnaithe Phortaigh na hÉireann agus an Cumann um Chosaint Foirgneamh Ársa a chlúdaíonn a gcostais oibriúcháin, agus bronnadh beagnach €1.4M ar chomhairlí contae trínár Scéim Tionscnamh na mBailte Stairiúla

Agus maoiniú níos mó ar fáil in 2022, bhí an Chomhairle Oidhreachta in ann aghaidh a thabhairt ar roinnt saincheisteanna práinneacha eile laistigh den earnáil. Bunaíodh scéim mhaoinithe nua, an Ciste Maoirseachta Oidhreachta, chun tacú le baill fairne i gcomhlacthaí poiblí agus in institiúidí oideachais tríú leibhéal atá ag obair ar chaomhnú fisiciúil réada oidhreachta nach mbeadh a bpríomhchúram dírithe go hiomlán ar an oidhreacht, ach a bhféadfadh tionchar a bheith ag a gcuid oibre ar chosaint sócmhainní oidhreachta uathúla mar sin féin.

Ar ndóigh, agus mar a dúirt Breandán, tá a fhios againn nach bhfuil sa mhaoiniú ach trian den phictiúr i ngan fhios dúinn. Ceann

de na héacataí is sásúla a bhain mé amach go dtí seo ná an méadú 66% ar lón na fairne ó 2019 agus cruthaíodh 7 bpost nua ag an gComhairle Oidhreachta in 2022 amhán. Cuireann an acmhainn bhreise seo ar ár gcumas críocha nua a fhiosrú, cuidíonn sé le smaointe nua a ghiniúint agus cuireann sé saineolas isteach inár gcuid oibre a mbeidh buntáistí forleathana ag baint leis don earnáil. I mbeagán focal, tá tionchar ollmhór ag an bhforbairt seo.

Baintear eolas, ar ndóigh, amach tríd an oideachas. Agus tá áthas orm a thuairisciú gur tháinig comhtháthú níos doimhne ar ár gcuid oibre le hinstiúidí agus tionscnaimh oideachais in 2022. I mí líul, chuireamar fálte roimh na chéad [cheardaithe cumasacha](#) sa chéad Chlár Scileanna Oidhreachta Uile-Éireann, cursa a bhfuil sé mar aidhm aige scileanna tógála oidhreachta a chaomhnú atá i mbaol a gcaillte, agus a d'fhorbraíomar i gcomhpháirtíocht le Fondúireacht an Phrionsa agus leis an Rannán Comhshaoil Stairiúla i dTuaisceart Éireann.

Agus mé ag scríobh, táimid ag céim chun cinn den phróiseas earcaíochta don dara bliain den chlár seo.

Idir an dá linn, thacaigh ár Scéim Intéirneachta Caomhnaithe le ceapadh [triúr intérneach](#) in 2022, chuaigh muid i gcomhpháirtíocht le hOllscoil Teicneolaíochta na Sionainne chun an Teastas in Athchóiriú Fuinnimh d'Fhoirgnimh Thraidisiúnta a sheachadadh, cursa a thug rannpháirtithe isteach ar bhunphrionsabail an athchóirthe fuinnimh, agus lean ár gclár Oidhreachta i Scoileanna do bhunscoileanna ag bláthú, rud a thug iontas na hoidhreachta do leanaí ar fud na tíre le 2,535 cuairt taifeadta go 998 55,000 páiste.

In 2023, ba mhaith linn tógáil ar an scéim seo, agus tú a chur leis an bpróiseas chun

oidhreacht a thabhairt isteach sa churaclam ag leibhéal na hiar-bhunscoile. De réir mar a scríobhaim, táimid ag earcú Oifigeach Forbartha Polasaí Oidhreachta san Oideachas chun cabhrú leis an gcuspóir seo a bhaint amach.

Tagann an tríú comhbáhar, croí, go héasca chuig ár n-earnáil agus tá an t-ádh orm go bhfuil fuinneamh agus teacht aniar ghairmithe agus oibrithe deonacha oidhreachta na hÉireann le feiceáil go laethúil.

Is beag duine a léiríonn an feachtas seo níos mó ná [Teddy Fennelly](#) mór, ár Laoch Oidhreachta 2022 a raibh sé de phléisiúr agam bualadh le chéile ar ócáidí éagsúla i rith na bliana. Taipéis shaibhir de chaomhnú na hoidhreachta is ea saothar a shaoil agus d'fhéadfaí a rá gurb é a thiomantas do scéal an Choirnél James Fitzmaurice agus an chéad eitilt thrasatlantach Thoir-Thiar an rud is mó a chuir sé le hoidhreachta na hÉireann.

Luaigh mé ár mbaill foirne nua a mbeidh am ag teastáil uathu, ar ndóigh, chun socrú isteach go hiomlán, agus muid ar fad ag dul in oiriúint do dhomhan athraithe oibre hibrideach. Tharla sé seo ag an am céanna nuair a d'imirigh comhghleacaí a bhfuil an-taithí aige sa Cheannasaí Airgeadais Paula Drohan agus ba mhaith liom ómós a thabhairt don tseirbhís iontach atá tugtha ag Paula don Chomhairle Oidhreachta le blianta fada.

Léiríonn 2022 freisin deireadh ár bPlean Straitéiseach roimhe seo, agus túis ár bplean nua cúig bliana, '[Ár n-Áit sa Stair](#)', a scríobhadh in 2022. Is clár uaillmhianach oibre é ina leagtar amach an treo a theastaíonn uainn chun an oidhreacht a thabhairt chun cinn sna cúig bliana amach romhainn.

Mar fhocal scoir, ba mhaith liom buíochas a ghabháil leis an Roinn Tithíochta, Rialtais Áitiúil

agus Oidhreachta (DHLGH), lena n-áirítear an tAire Darragh O'Brien TD, an tAire Tithíochta, Rialtais Áitiúil agus Oidhreachta agus an tAire Stáit Malcolm Noonan TD, an tAire Stáit oidhreachta agus Athchóirithe Toghcháin. Bhí an bheirt airí fial flaithiúil lena gcuid ama, ag glacadh páirte in imeachtaí éagsúla agus ag tacú lenár gcuid oibre. Táim buíoch, freisin, de na hoifigigh sa Rannán Oidhreachta, DHLGH, a bhfuil a dtacaíocht agus a n-abhcóide leanúnach buíoch as.

Ba mhaith liom buíochas a ghabháil freisin lenár gcomhpháirtithe sa rialtas áitiúil, go háirithe oifigigh oidhreachta na n-údarás áitiúil. Leanann comhoibriú ár gcomhghleacaithe ar fud raon gníomhaireachtaí agus gnólachtaí seirbhíse poiblí de bheith ina thacaíocht luachmhar i ngach gné dár gcuid oibre, mar aon le comhoibriú ghrúpaí na sochaí sibhialta agus na hearnála neamhbhrabús. Táim an-bhródúil as a ndílseacht, a dtiomantas, a bhfuinneamh agus a nuálaíocht thar ceann earnáil na hoidhreachta.

Táim ag tnúth le dóchas don Chomhairle leanúint lena cuid oibre chun rannpháirtíocht an phobail san oidhreacht a mhéadú ina léirithe go léir.

Chuaigh an Chomhairle Oidhreachta i gcomhpháirtíocht le hOllscoil Teicneolaíochta na Sionainne (OTS) chun an cúrsa Bunúsanna Athchóirithe Fuinnimh d'Fhoirgnimh Thraigisiúnta (BAFFT) a sheachadadh in 2022. Seachadadh an chéad mhodúl den Teastas Ardleibhéal Leibhéal 8 ó Mheán Fómhair go Samhain 2022. D'eisigh an Chomhairle Oidhreachta Deimhnithe Tinrimh FGL do 42 rannpháirtí ag deireadh mhí na Samhna 2022. Bhí an rogha ag rannpháirtithe dul ar aghaidh go dtí an dara modúl. Beidh céimithe an chúrsa seo ríthábhachtach chun a chinntiú go ndéanfar uasghrádú riachtanach fuinnimh ar fhoirgnimh stairiúla ar bhealach atá bíil don oidhreacht ailtireachta.

In 2019, fuair an Chomhairle Oidhreachta maoiniú ó Éire Ildánach chun clár píolótach ceardlann a reáchtáil a bhí thírithe ar eispéireas níos airde a thabhairt agus, dá bhrí sin, feasacht ar an timpeallacht nádúrtha a thabhairt do dhaoine a bhfuil lagú radhairc orthu. Tugtar ag Teachtaí ar Do Chéadfaí Nádúrtha ar an tionscadal seo.

Ba é túspointe an tionscadail seo ná go mbeadh taithí níos fearr ag daoine a bhfuil lagú radhairc suntasach orthu ar ár saol nádúrtha dá dtabharfaí oiliúint bhunúsach dóibh maidir le léirmhíniú a dhéanamh ar fhuaimeanna na bithéagsúlachta ina dtimpeallacht laethúil agus timpeall air.

Tháinig buaicphointe 2022 le linn Sheachtain Náisiúnta na Bithéagsúlachta i mí na Bealtaine nuair a tógadh árngrúpa ar ócáid siúlóide agus cainte ag tosú ag Ionad Cuairteoirí Oileán an Bulla Thuaidh, áit ar labhair Ball Boird na Comhairle Oidhreachta, an Dr Mary Tubridy, faoi na hiontais luibheolaíocha a bhaineann leis an gcóras dumhcha a bhfuil tábhacht idirnáisiúnta ag baint leis.

Ansin thug Andrew Lynch ó BirdWatch Ireland an rang trasna ag na réileán láibe chun éisteacht leis na lapairí agus ar aghaidh go coillte Pháirc Naomh Ann, áit ar éist na ranannpháirtithe le haghaidh tiuf-teafanna agus ceolaire sailí.

Is é sin an t-éileamh ó gach cearn den tír turais a eagrú gurb é príomhfhócas ár gcuid oibre ar an gclár seo in 2022 bealaí a aimsiú chun é a leathnú ach acmhainní a chur ar fáil dó dá réir chun cabhrú le freastal ar chuid den éileamh.

Is scéim deontais de chuid na Comhairle Oidhreachta é an Ciste Acmhainne Oidhreachta a bhfuil sé mar aidhm aici cur le cumas eagraíochtaí neamhrialtasacha, a bhfuil ábharthacht náisiúnta léirithe acu, a bheith ag obair san earnáil oidhreachta

trí mhaoiniú a chur ar fáil i dtreo a bpríomhchostais. Chuir an Chomhairle Oidhreachta comhairle ar an nGrúpa Tearmann sa Dúlra agus san Oidhreacht a reáchtálann na turais chun iarratas a dhéanamh ar bhunmhaioniú faoin scéim seo, agus fuair siad amach go luath in 2023 gur éirigh leo. Cuirfidh sé seo ar chumas an tionscadail fás agus lón níos mó PSA a chur san áireamh.

I measc na dturas i mbliana bhí turais an-rathúil go An Loilíoch Mhór i gCo. Chill Dara agus chuig Garraithe Náisiúnta na Lus.

Chomh maith le comhairle straitéiseach a chur ar fáil maidir le cúram agus caomhnú fadtéarmach na mbailiúchán leathan d'ábhar clóite, de shaothair ealaíne agus de réada oidhreachta cultúrtha atá i seilbh Pavee Point, tá an Chomhairle Oidhreachta ag leanúint leis an obair thábhachtach a bhaineann le creat a fhorbairt chun tacaíocht níos fearr a thabhairt d'oidhreacht na Taistéalaithe agus Romaigh.


Tá an obair seo le Pavee Point á déanamh i gcomhthráth le hionadaithe, grúpaí agus eagraíochtaí ó gach cearn de Thaistéalaithe agus den phobal Romach ar fud na hÉireann agus léiríonn sí tiomantas na Comhairle Oidhreachta chun a chinntíú go gcuirtear tacaíochtaí fadtéarmacha, straitéiseacha agus inbhuanaithe ar fáil d'Oidhreacht na Taistéalaithe.

Scéimeanna Deontais

Trína Scéim Deontais Oidhreachta Pobail, spreagann an Chomhairle Oidhreachta iarratais go gníomhach a dhíríonn ar rochtain níos fearr ar ghníomhaíochtaí oidhreachta ag daoine faoi mhíchumas agus, dá bhrí sin, ar rannpháirtíocht iontu. Cuirtear iarratasóirí ar aghaidh chuig láithreán gréasáin an Údarás Náisiúnta Míchumais chun a chinntíú go leanann tionscadail dea-chleachtas.

Tá suim ar leith ag an gComhairle Oidhreachta freisin i dtionscadail a thugann aghaidh ar oidhreacht grúpaí mionlaigh, pobail nua agus oidhreacht na Taistéalaithe.

Faoi scéim in 2022, bronnadh maoiniú ar ocht dtionscadal déag a dhírig ar inrochtaineacht agus éagsúlacht. I measc na dtionscadal bhí feabhas a chur ar rochtain ar fhoirgnimh stairiúla do dhaoine a bhfuil saincheisteanna soghluaisteachta acu, taispeántais thadhlacha a shuiteáil i músaem do thionscadail a dhírig ar fheasacht ar chultúr na Taistéalaithe agus ar oidhreacht na bpobal LADT a mhéadú. B'ionann an leithdháileadh iomlán maoinithe agus €226,639.



Tuairisciú ar an Aeráid

Faoi Shainordú na hEarnála Poiblí um Ghnímh don Aeráid, ceanglaítear ar chomhlachtaí poiblí sonraí fuinnimh bliantúla a thuairisciú gach bliain.

Tuairiscíonn an Chomhairle Oidhreachta d'Údarás Fuinnimh Inmharthana na hÉireann (UFIhÉ) agus cuitear torthaí iomlána san áireamh i dtuarascáil feidhmíochta éifeachtúlachta fuinnimh na hearnála poiblí 2022.

Chomh maith lena freagrachtaí a chomhlíonadh faoi Shainordú na hEarnála Poiblí um Ghnímh don Aeráid, féachann an Chomhairle Oidhreachta le gníomh díreach a dhéanamh trí thionscnaimh a chur i bhfeidhm chun ár lorg carbón a laghdú agus cleachtais inbhuanaithe a chur chun cinn laistigh dár n-eagraíocht. Trí oibríochtaí atá tíosach ar fhuinneamh, bainistiú dramhaíola, agus glacadh le cleachtais ghnó inbhuanaithe lena n-áirítear soláthar glas, déanaimid ár ndícheall ár dtionchar ar an gcomhshaoil a íoslaghcdú agus ár bhfreagrachtaí a chomhlíonadh trí na Spriocanna Forbartha Inbhuanaithe.

Aithnímid freisin an tábhacht a bhaineann lenár dtionchar sa réimse níos leithne.

Ag comhoibriú le comhpháirtithe straitéiseacha, páirtithe leasmhara, gníomhaireachtaí rialtais, agus grúpaí pobail, tacaímid le bainistiú inbhuanaithe oidhreachta agus déanaimid breithnithe aeráide a chomhtháthú i ngach clár oidhreachta. Trí fheasacht a ardú agus comhpháirtíochtaí a chothú, tá sé mar aidhm againn a chinntíú go gcaomhnófar ár n-oidhreacht shaibhir thógtha, chultúrtha agus nádúrtha go hinbhuanaithe do na glúnta atá le teacht i bhfianaise an athraithe aeráide.

Chun aghaidh a thabhairt ar thionchar na haeráide ar an oidhreacht, agus chun leas a bhaint as acmhainneacht na hoidhreachta chun pobail a mhealladh le forbairt inbhuanaithe, leanfaimid orainn ag forbairt clár straitéiseach a thacaíonn le tionscadail taighde agus nuálacha.


Cuirfidh na tionscnaimh sin feabhas ar athléimneacht agus ar inoiriúnaitheacht i bhfianaise athruithe comhshaoil. Díreimid ar chomhroinnt eolais agus ar fhorbairt acmhainní, ag cur ar chumas cleachtóirí oidhreachta breithnithe aeráide a ionchorprú ina gcuid oibre agus cur chuige níos inbhuanaithe a chur chun cinn maidir le caomhnú na hoidhreachta.

Caomhnú Fuinnimh


Faoi ghealltanais AE agus náisiúnta na hÉireann agus faoi spriocanna níos leithne maidir le hathrú aeráide, ní mór do gach comhlacht poiblí laghdú 51% ar astaíochtaí gás ceaptha teasa (GCT) a bhaineann le fuinneamh a bhaint amach agus feabhas 50% a chur ar éifeachtúlacht fuinnimh faoi 2030.

Léirítear i bhFíor 1 dul chun cinn bliantúil na Comhairle Oidhreachta maidir lenár dtáscaire feidhmíochta fuinnimh arna ríomh ag UFIhÉ, arna ríomh mar úsáid fuinnimh iomlán in kWh roinnte ar achar urláir. Tá coigilteas fuinnimh

27.4% bainte amach ag an gComhairle Oidhreachta ónár mbliain bhonnlíne (2009) agus tá laghdú 25.7% ar ár n-ídiú fuinnimh iomlán sa tréimhse sin. Tar éis dúnadh oifige ar feadh cuid mhaith de 2020 agus 2021 mar gheall ar shrianta COVID, d'fhill muid ar an oifig in 2022 agus mar thoradh ar ár bhfás mar eagraíocht tháinig méadú 61.7% ar úsáid fuinnimh. Mar sin féin, táimid fós ar an sprioc chun ár gcoigilteas riachtanach a bhaint amach faoi 2030 agus soláthróidh tionscadail coigilte fuinnimh sna blianta amach romhainn an coigilteas 45.2% riachtanach a theastaíonn faoi 2030.

B'ionann tomhaltas fuinnimh na Comhairle Oidhreachta in 2022 agus 220,995 kWh (arna shloinneadh mar riachtanas iomlán fuinnimh phríomhúil, arna ríomh ag UFIhÉ), méadú 74% ar 2021, agus laghdú 26% ón mbliain bhonnlíne de 2009. Is ionann sin agus thart ar 0.002% d'úsáid fuinnimh na hearnála poiblí. Taispeántar miondealú na húsáide sa chaitiú thíos. Is é an chuid is mó dár n-úsáid fuinnimh gás le haghaidh téimh (68%), agus leictreachas ina dhiaidh sin (32%) Cuireann cumhacht gréine a úsáidtear le haghaidh téamh uisce (níos lú ná 1%) leis an gcuid bheag in-athnuaithe teirmeach.

B'ionann Astaíochtaí OC₂ na Comhairle Oidhreachta a bhaineann le Fuinneamh in 2022 agus 39,026 kg OC₂, méadú 69.7% ar 2021, go príomha mar thoradh ar fhilleadh ar oifig tar éis COVID. Tháinig an chuid is mó den OC₂ seo ó ghás agus an chuid eile ón leictreachas. Ós rud é nach n-oibríonn an Chomhairle Oidhreachta flít, ní thuairiscítear astaíochtaí iompair trí chóras UFIhÉ, cé go bhfuil iompar gnó mar chuid dár bpróifil astaíochtaí agus scrúdófar é sna blianta amach romhainn chun coigilteas a dhéanamh.

Tuairisciú ar Phleanáil



Tháinig Coiste Pleanála na Comhairle Oidhreachta le chéile ocht n-uaire le linn 2022.

Is comhlacht forordaithe í an Chomhairle Oidhreachta sa phróiseas pleanála, toisc go raibh sé mar phríomhghná de ghníomhaíochtaí an Choiste Pleanála athbhreithniú a choimisiúnú ar an ngne seo dá cuid oibre. Cuireadh an t-athbhreithniú seo ar tairiscint go poiblí agus tar éis do chomhairleoírí pleanála measúnaithe a bheith ceaptha. Reáchtáladh próiseas comhairliúchán le húdarás áitiúla, leis an rialtas náisiúnta agus le heagraíochtaí neamhrialtasacha agus tugadh dréacht-tuarascáil chun críche faoi mhí na Nollag 2022 d'fhoinn í a thabhairt chun críche go luath in 2023.

Maidir leis an bpolasaí pleanála, cuireadh dhá aighneacht fhoirmiúla faoi bhráid an rialtais. Mar chuid den chomhairliúchán le páirtithe leasmhara maidir le dréachtú an Bhille nua Pleanála agus Forbartha, iarradh ar an gComhairle a tuairimí a fháil maidir le forálacha oidhreachta ailtireachta an Acharta um Pleanáil agus Forbairt 2000 atá ann cheana, arna leasú. Chríochnaigh an Chomhairle a haighneacht chuig an bhFóram Comhairleach Pleanála ina raibh moltaí maidir le hainmniúcháin Limistéar Caomhantais Ailtireachta agus eisiúint Dearbhuithe alt 57. Cuireadh tuairimí ar fáil freisin faoin ngá atá ann saineolas cuí a chinntíú i ngach údarás áitiúil agus ar oidhreacht tírdhreacha. Chuir an Coiste túis le measúnú ar an mBille um Pleanáil agus Forbairt atá ag teacht chun cinn i mí na Nollag 2022.

Cuireadh aighneacht faoi bhráid an Aire Tithíochta, Rialtais Áitiúil agus Oidhreachta maidir le Pleananna Limistéir Áitiúil in 2022 faoi alt 7 den Acht Oidhreachta. Ligeann sé seo d'aighneachtaí foirmiúla beartais a chur faoi bhráid an Aire. Moladh san aighneacht seo go n-eiseofaí treoirlínte athbhreithnithe

LAP a léiríonn an beartas nua Tús Áite do Lár Baile, go mbainfí úsáid níos mó as ainmniúcháin Limistéar Caomhantais Ailtireachta agus Déanmhais Chosanta i lár bailte stairiúla chomh maith le tuiscint níos fearr ar dhoimhneacht ama agus ar oidhreacht sa réamhrá le LAPS.

Thug an Coiste Pleanála comhairle chomh maith maidir le dréachtú dhá aighneacht phleanála chuig an mBord Pleanála maidir le gairdín stairiúil i nGleanntán Eoin, Co. Chorcaí agus tionscadal athnuachana uirbí ag Sráid Bhaile Átha Cliath, baile Mhuineacháin.



Rialachas Corparáideach

Is é beartas na Comhairle Oidhreachta na caighdeáin is airde rialachais chorparáidigh a choinneáil i gcomhréir le beartais agus cleachtais a nglactar leo go ginearálta. Tá an Chomhairle tiomanta d'fhorálacha ábhartha Chód Cleachtas 2016 um Rialachas Comhlachtaí Stáit a chomhlíonadh. Tá Coiste Iníúchta, Riosca agus Airgeadais bunaithe ag an gComhairle Oidhreachta, a dhéanann athbhreithniú rialta ar an gcóras rialaithe inmheánaigh agus a théann i ngleic le saineolas seachtrach i gcomhlíonadh a feidhmeanna, lena n-áirítear feidhm an iniúchta inmheánaigh, de réir mar is cuí. Tá an Chomhairle Oidhreachta go hiomlán comhlíontach ó thaobh cánach de agus ní glacann sí páirt in idirbhearta seachanta cánach ‘maslacha’.

Íocaíochtaí Prasa 2022

Ceanglaítear ar an gComhairle Oidhreachta ceanglais I.R. Uimh. 580/2012 Rialacháin na gComphphobal Eorpach (Íocaíocht Dhéanach in Idirbhearta Tráchtala), 2012 agus a réamhtheachtaí, an tAcht um Íoc Pras Cuntas 1997 (ar a dtugtar na ‘Rialacháin’ le chéile). Is iad téarmaí caighdeánacha creidmheasa na Comhairle a ghlactar, mura sonraítear a mhalaírt i socruithe conarthacha, ná 30 lá ón sonrasc a fháil. Tá nósanna imeachta curtha i bhfeidhm a thugann dearbhú réasúnta i gcoinne neamhchomhlíonadh ábhartha na Rialachán. Cé go bhfuil na nósanna imeachta deartha chun comhlíonadh na Rialachán a chinntiú, ní féidir leo ach dearbhú réasúnta agus ní dearbhú iomlán a thabhairt do neamhchomhlíonadh Acht 1997 agus I.R. Uimh. 580/2012.

Léiríonn athbhreithniú ar na híocaíochtaí go léir a rinneadh i rith na bliana dar críoch 31 Nollaig 2022 7 n-íocaíocht arbh fhiú €8,318 san iomlán iad as a dtáinig pionós úis de €424 faoi na rialacháin thusa.

Le héifeacht ón 1 Iúil 2011, ceanglaíodh ar an gComhairle Oidhreachta Cinntí S29296 an Rialtais a chomhlíonadh maidir leis an riail um íoc pras 15 lá. Tá na noctuithe a éilítear sa Mheabhrán Rialtais (MOG) a thacaíonn leis na cinntí thusa don tréimhse 1 Eanáir 2022 go 31 Nollaig 2022 sonraithe sa tábla thíos.

Responsibilities of Board members

As detailed in the governance statement and Board members' report, the Board members are responsible for

- the preparation of annual financial statements in the form prescribed under section 21 of the Heritage Act 1995
- ensuring that the financial statements give a true and fair view in accordance with FRS 102
- ensuring the regularity of transactions
- assessing whether the use of the going concern basis of accounting is appropriate, and
- such internal control as they determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Responsibilities of the Comptroller and Auditor General

I am required under section 21 of the Heritage Act 1995 to audit the financial statements of the Heritage Council and to report thereon to the Houses of the Oireachtas.

My objective in carrying out the audit is to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement due to fraud or error. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with the ISAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with the ISAs, I exercise professional judgment and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. In doing so,

- the accounting records were not sufficient to permit the financial statements to be readily and properly audited, or
- the financial statements are not in agreement with the accounting records.

Information other than the financial statements

My opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information presented with those statements, and I do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with my audit of the financial statements, I am required under the ISAs to read the other information presented and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or with knowledge obtained during the audit, or if it otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work I have performed, I conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, I am required to report that fact.

Reporting on other matters

My audit is conducted by reference to the special considerations which attach to State bodies in relation to their management and operation. I report if I identify any material matters relating to the manner in which public business has been conducted.

I seek to obtain evidence about the regularity of financial transactions in the course of audit. I report if I identify any material instance where public money has not been applied for the purposes intended or where transactions did not conform to the authorities governing them.
