- Projects that demonstrate strong public engagement and inclusiveness

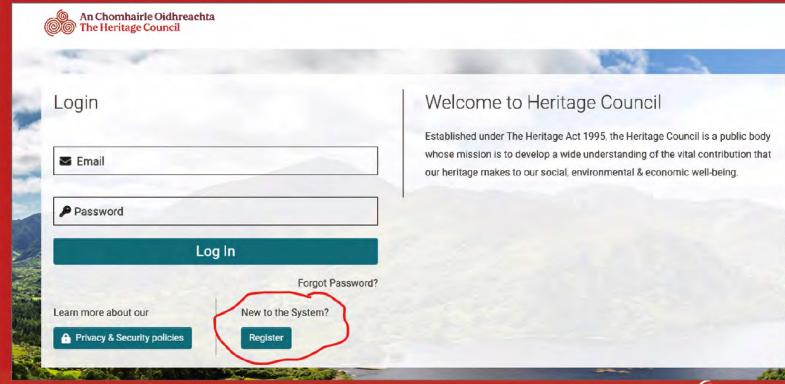

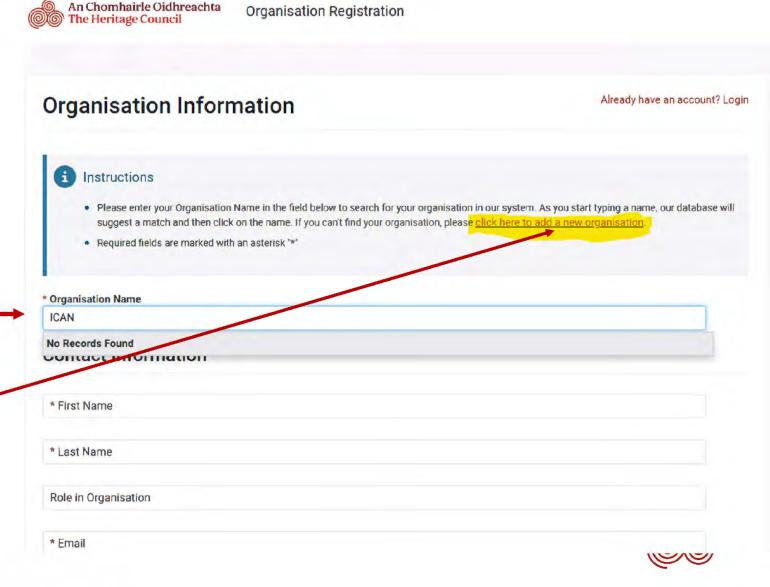
- New Online Grants System
- All users must register their organisation first on online grants system



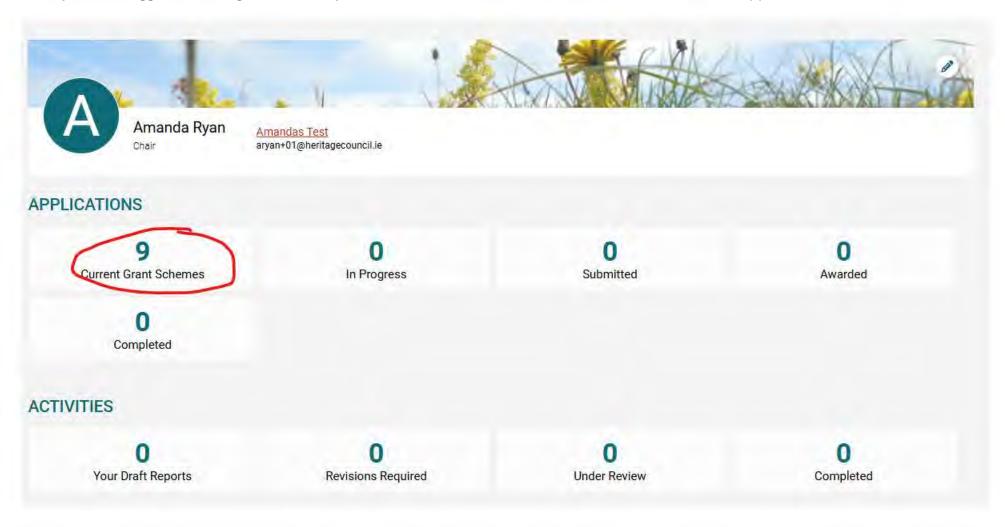

 Organisation Name first and if already on our system, complete your contact details.

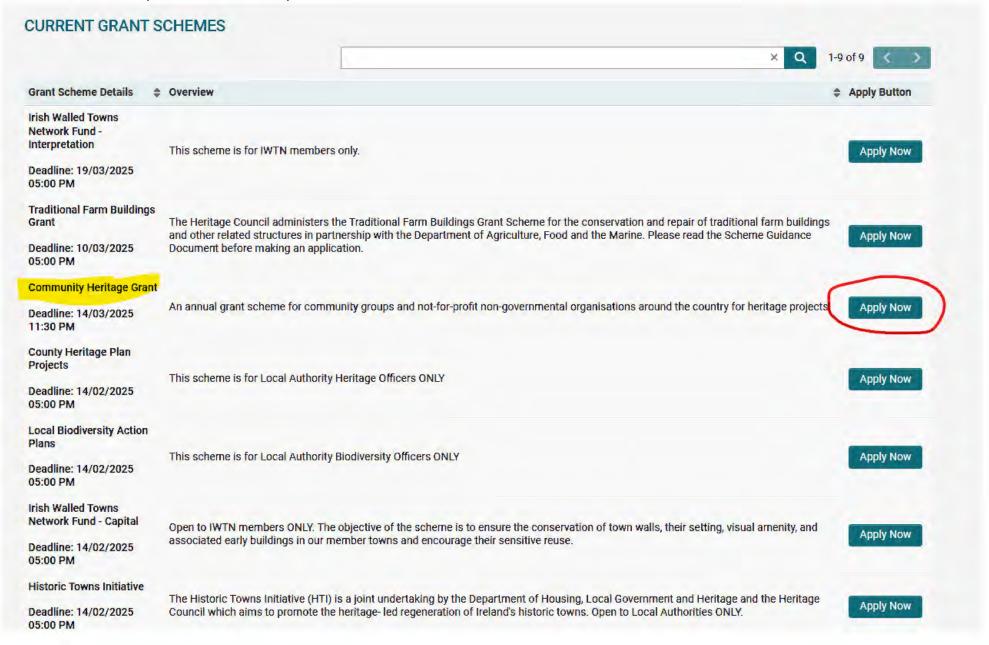
- If not, click on Add a new organisation to complete the registration form

Once you have logged onto the grants online system, select Current Grant Schemes to commence a new Application

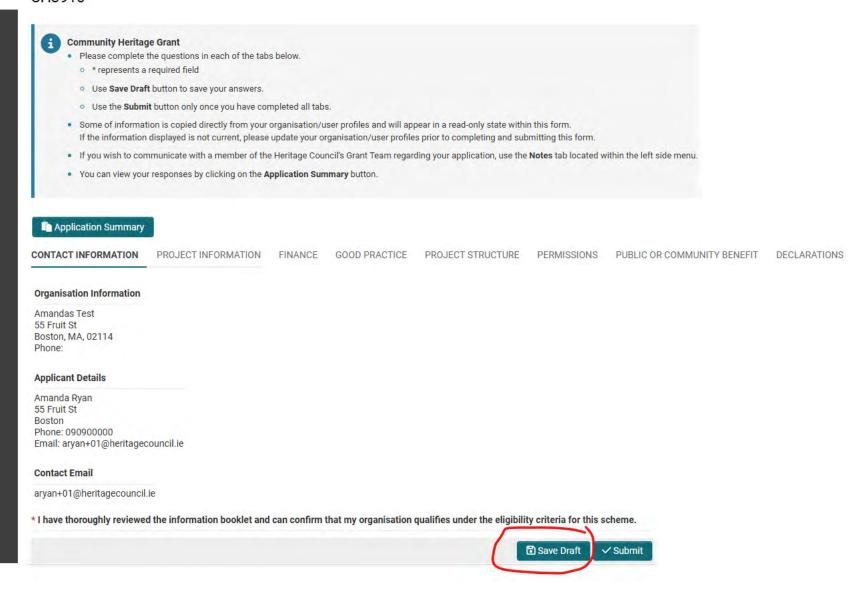

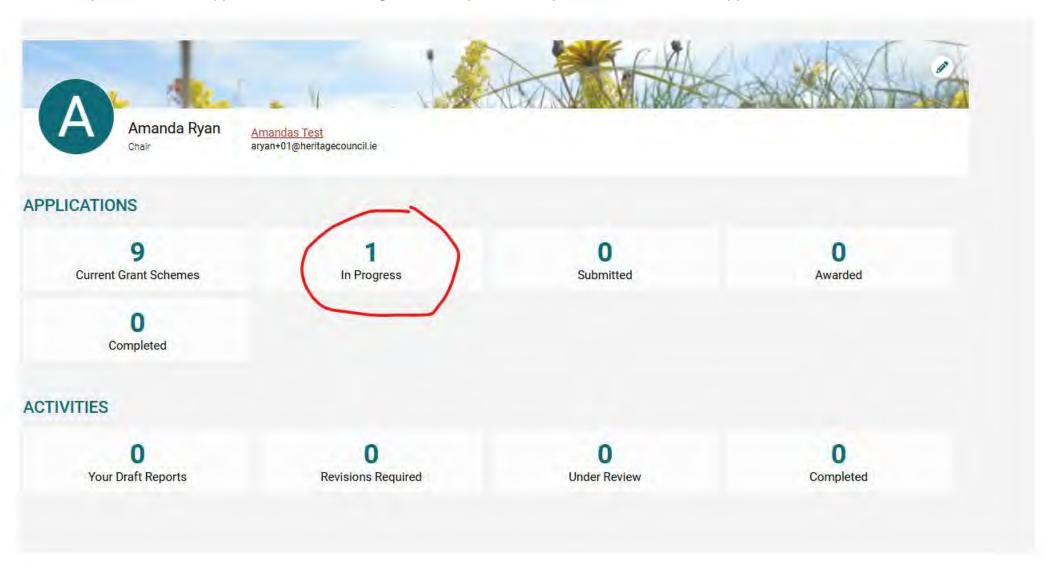


Once you Save Draft your application is now saved for completion and editing until the deadline time and date.

Making your application

Before you start, make sure you have read the Application Guidance Document



All projects must include quotations, scope of works, photos,

evidence of

heritage advise,

letters of support,

bank header, and

permissions, or

site owners

applicable



Answer all template questions concisely



Use **check list** on the Guidance Document to ensure you include all documents required for your

type of project.



Budget – ensure you include all costs such as project advisor and any VAT. One quote is required for each line item. You must demonstrate how you meet any shortfall



Demonstrate that you are willing to communicate and promote your work and the role of the Heritage Council e.g. plans to reach newer audiences, provide online activity stats, attendee number for previous outreach and training programmes



If in doubt check with the Heritage Council!





What kind of projects?

- Workshops and training events that promote good heritage practice, for example traditional building skills, graveyard recording or workshops on improving energy efficiency in traditional buildings to reduce carbon footprints
- Development of Digital Heritage Resources including online exhibitions, oral history recordings, podcasts, and films. All digital outputs you create with grant funding are available, open, and accessible.
- Conservation surveys, reports, plans, and audits that will inform the future management of buildings and monuments, habitats, collections, or objects.
- Conservation works to buildings, monuments, habitats, collections, or objects.
- Purchase of specialised equipment.

Eligible costs

- Third party costs e.g., professional fees for a heritage practitioner or a professional website designer
- Project dedicated contracted staff if it is your intention to increase hours for a part time staff member to work on the project, please provide a letter of confirmation from the CEO/Manager
- Travel and subsistence costs for volunteers

Ineligible costs

We cannot provide grant funding for the following:

- Payment of the applicant group/or a member providing services/goods to the project
- Voluntary work
- Overheads/ Administration fees / Salaries of existing employees
- International travel
- Costs incurred before an offer date



General Advice

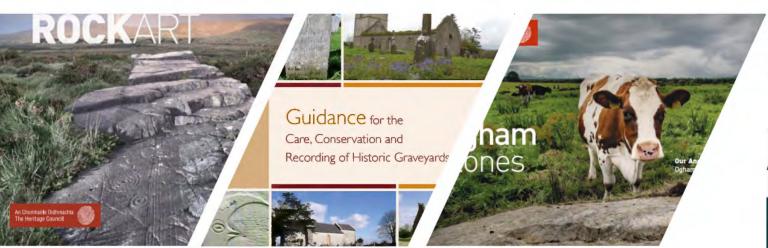
- All supporting documents must be in PDF format and less than 10mb each.
- Engage with your local Heritage Officer, Biodiversity Officer and/or Architectural Conservation Officer
- Rally community support The value of your application is always increased significantly with the inclusion of community support (letters of support)
- Start gathering information early statement of need (why this project is needed), photographs of the collection or place, your group in action, budget plan, letters of support, screengrabs from social media.
- **Don't delay!** Make sure you **leave ample time** to complete the application before the grant deadline.
- It's a good idea to have someone else such as a colleague or fellow committee group member read your draft grant application before you submit it.

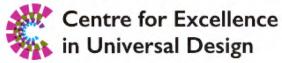


- Do not assume the assessors know your project or your organisation.
 For example, upload a copy of recommendations from previous reports to demonstrate why this project is important.
- Put yourself in the shoes of the grant assessor so make sure to explain your project in a clear and concise way.
- Be realistic about what you want to achieve and that you can deliver a successful project.

for caring for your **Historic Graveyard**

BEFORE YOU BEGIN

- Always consult your Local Authority Heritage Officer for advice on best practice
- Check ownership of the graveyard and seek the owner's permission
- Carefully consider the impact of what you are planning. Work should enhance the character and setting, taking into account both built and natural
- Works that may involve ground disturbance or work to built fabric require consultation with National Monuments Service. The necessary guidance can be
- Make a plan! A plan should describe the condition of the various features in the graveyard and what work is required. A useful template prepared by HISTORIC GRAVES can be found HERE.

THINGS TO AVOID

- Excessive mowing and use of herbicides as these impact native plants, insects and animals,
- · Removal of Ivy from ruins without expert advice and
- Power washing, sand blasting or chemical treatment of headstones. Modern recording methods can now be used to read many difficult to decipher inscriptions
- · Attempts to flatten the 'humps and bumps' of the surface and unnecessary removal of headstones (e.g. to place against a wall). This seriously affects the character of the graveyard.
- Using termac or concrete on new or existing

MASONRY AND MEMO

- Get the necessary expert advice for repa conservation of structural remains.
- Keep pathways clear of vegetation
- Boundary walls should be maintained by reusing original stone, keeping c stiles and using recessed pointing

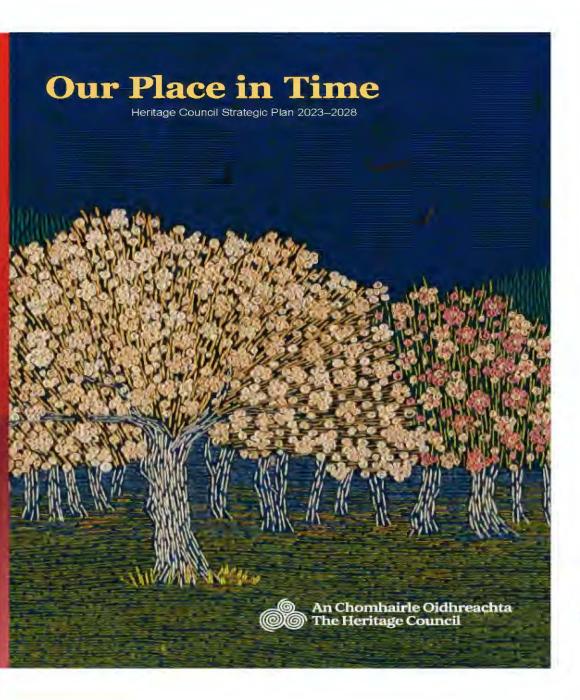
