Foreword

The Heritage Council recognises that there is an urgent need to protect, preserve and promote Traveller cultural heritage. ‘Our Place in Time: Heritage Council Strategic Plan 2023 – 2028’ made the following commitment:

“Working in partnership with the Traveller community, [The Heritage Council will] ensure that Traveller heritage is acknowledged and preserved. To this end, we will develop a Traveller Heritage Strategy.”

In 2023, the Heritage Council established a Traveller-led working group (of Travellers and representatives of Traveller organisations) to develop this strategy. This group has provided thorough oversight and powerful advocacy throughout the development process to ensure that this strategy reflects the needs and wishes of Irish Travellers. The Heritage Council is enormously grateful to the members of the working group, under the leadership of working group Convenor, Owen Ward, for their time, expertise and input.

A key element of ensuring the co-design of this strategy was a national consultation, undertaken in 2024/25. I wish to express the sincere thanks of the Heritage Council to all those who participated in this consultation exercise. It is very important that this strategy is community-led, and therefore we gratefully acknowledge the generosity and honesty of those members of the Traveller community who engaged with the consultation process. We also thank Exchange House Ireland, the Irish Traveller Movement, Mincéirs Whiden, the National Traveller Women’s Forum, Pavee Point Traveller and Roma Centre and the Western Traveller and Intercultural Development Centre who acted as co-organisers and hosts of the consultation events.

In publishing this strategy, the Heritage Council acknowledges the profound inherent value of Traveller culture and heritage, the centrality of Travellers to Irish heritage and the important role of cultural heritage in tackling systemic racism, inequality and exclusion.

This first Traveller Heritage Strategy represents an important step in ensuring that there is the necessary infrastructure of resources to create the conditions for Traveller heritage to thrive. Importantly, this strategy is underpinned by a workplan and resources, to ensure that there is a strong network of strategic, sustainable and community-led support for Traveller cultural heritage.

On behalf of the Heritage Council, I welcome the publication of this strategy and look forward to working with members of the Traveller community and Traveller organisations, to ensure greater support and increased recognition of the vital contribution of Travellers and Traveller heritage to Irish society.

Opening Statement from Traveller Heritage Strategy Working Group Convenor

This is the first Traveller Heritage Strategy published by the Heritage Council and as such, the members of the working group and I have sought to ensure that it establishes a framework of foundational support that will develop and increase over time. There has been a sustained underinvestment in the cultural heritage of the Traveller community, despite longstanding calls for increased support and the official recognition of Irish Travellers as an ethnic minority in 2017.

This strategy outlines six key strategic commitments:

- Directing supported, dedicated funding to heritage projects within the Traveller community.
- Establishing a Traveller-led high-level working group to address the urgent need to safe-guard Traveller language.
- Undertaking a scoping study to understand possible operational models for a National Centre for Traveller Heritage.
- A live web directory that facilitates ongoing access to the many extant and emerging Traveller Heritage online repositories, projects and resources.
- A certification scheme to ensure heritage organisations, across all aspects of their operations, represent and respect Traveller heritage and the Traveller community.
- Establishing a Traveller-led oversight group that will oversee the delivery of this strategy.

The wish of the working group is that this strategy enables the Traveller community to reach a point where Traveller heritage enjoys parity of investment and respect. Achieving this will require significant effort and resources to address the legacy of underinvestment and the resulting inequalities.

The ongoing implementation, monitoring and evaluation of the commitments made here by a Traveller-led oversight group will strengthen the delivery of this plan. We welcome the commitment of the Heritage Council in publishing this strategy and look forward to continuing to work together to ensure the greatest possible positive impact of this strategy for the Traveller community.

Introduction

The formal recognition by the Irish State of Traveller ethnicity in 2017 marked a significant milestone in Irish society, affirming the unique cultural heritage and identity of Irish Travellers. This Traveller Heritage Strategy sets out the Heritage Council's commitment to recognising, preserving, and celebrating the cultural heritage of the Traveller community in Ireland.

Traveller heritage is profoundly valuable. It has a deep inherent value to Irish Travellers and is an intrinsic part of Ireland's national identity. Traveller heritage encompasses many varied and unique expressions that have been passed down through the generations. There have been decades of Traveller activism and advocacy for cultural recognition and equality, acknowledging the community's distinct ethnic identity and the essential role heritage plays in fostering pride, belonging, and respect.

The Heritage Council, led by the Traveller Heritage Strategy Working Group, has created this strategy to respond to the lack of targeted investment in Traveller culture and heritage. It aims to safeguard and promote Traveller heritage through a comprehensive, inclusive, and culturally sensitive approach that places Traveller voices and experiences at its core.

This strategy is grounded in a co-designed methodology that respects the diversity within the Traveller community and seeks to create safe, respectful spaces for dialogue and engagement. This strategy was developed through the input of a Traveller-led Traveller Heritage Strategy Working Group, which included representatives of four national representative bodies (the Irish Traveller Movement, Pavee Point Traveller and Roma Centre, the National Traveller Women's Forum, Mincéirs Whidden) as well as six other Traveller organisations and representatives. The Heritage Council and the Department of Children, Disability and Equality, which has oversight on the implementation of the National Traveller and Roma Inclusion Strategy II 2024-2028 (NTRIS II) were also represented on this working group. A national consultation was undertaken by the working group to inform this strategy. Details of both the working group and consultation can be found in the appendices.

By fostering collaboration among Irish Travellers, cultural institutions and state bodies, this strategy aspires to build a sustainable framework that enhances the visibility and appreciation of Traveller cultural heritage across society and supports the transmission of Traveller heritage to future generations.

Through this strategy, the Heritage Council reaffirms its dedication to working in partnership with the Traveller community and Traveller organisations to ensure that Traveller heritage is not only acknowledged and preserved but also celebrated as a fundamental and living part of Ireland's shared cultural landscape.

Legislative and Policy Context

The Heritage Council's Traveller Heritage Strategy aligns with Irish equality legislation, including the Equal Status Acts 2000–2018¹ and the Employment Equality Acts 1998–2015², which prohibit discrimination based on ethnicity, including membership of the Traveller community. In addition, the strategy responds to Section 42 of the Irish Human Rights and Equality Act 2014³ ("Public Sector Equality and Human Rights Duty").

The Heritage Council's National Traveller Heritage Strategy seeks to support the advancement of Theme 8: Culture Heritage and Identity within the National Traveller and Roma Inclusion Strategy II 2024-2028⁴(NTRIS II), specifically to "ensure ongoing, sustainable and visible support for, and promotion of, Traveller and Roma culture, heritage and traditions". This strategy is action 60 under the NTRIS II Action Plan 2024 - 2026.

This strategy reaffirms the commitment given within Our Place in Time: Heritage Council Strategic Plan 2023 - 2028 and it forms part of the Heritage Council's Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Policy. It aligns with both the Heritage Council's strategic and DEI principles.

It also aligns with broader national and international commitments to cultural rights, social justice, and the decolonisation of heritage practices, including the Faro Convention: Council of Europe Framework Convention on the Value of Cultural Heritage for Society, the UNESCO Convention for the Safeguarding of Intangible Cultural Heritage, the Council of Europe Framework Convention for the Protection of National Minorities⁵, UNESCO Convention on the Protection and Promotion of the Diversity of Cultural Expressions⁶, and the UN International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights⁷.

Mission

To promote and protect the dignity, cultural identity, and human rights of the Traveller community by fostering inclusive participation, safeguarding Traveller heritage, and ensuring equitable access to heritage preservation resources and opportunities.

Vision

An Ireland in which the Traveller community is fully respected, valued, and supported as a core component of the nation's diverse cultural fabric, ensuring the preservation, continuation and celebration of Traveller heritage and Travellers' cultural rights.

Values / Principles

- Dignity and Respect: Recognising and valuing every individual and their culture with fairness, non-discrimination, and pride in identity.
- Traveller-Led Participation: Ensuring Traveller voices lead and shape heritage policies, programmes, and initiatives that affect or impact the Traveller community.
- Inclusion and Social Justice: Committing to equitable treatment and opportunities, addressing systemic inequalities and fostering cohesion.
- Preservation, Promotion and Celebration: Safeguarding and celebrating Traveller heritage, language, traditions, and other expressions of cultural heritage as intrinsic components of Ireland's national heritage.
- Collaboration and Partnership: Working in genuine partnership with Traveller organisations, public bodies, and wider society to achieve shared goals.
- Safe and Supportive Spaces: Creating trauma-informed, culturally sensitive environments that enable meaningful engagement and empowerment.
- Mainstreaming and targeted approach: Implementing specific actions that do not create new forms of segregation, aiming for mainstream participation.



Strategy Framework

Recognition, Visibility, Access and Celebration

- Increase access to Traveller heritage and increase representation of Traveller heritage nationally by establishing an online **Traveller Heritage Directory, which will be promoted via ongoing community outreach**, and explore potential models for a **Traveller Heritage Hub**.
- Support the safeguarding, preservation, and promotion of all forms of Traveller heritage while ensuring access and community-led approaches via a dedicated **Traveller Heritage Grant Scheme**.
- Promote Traveller representation in museums and archives to ensure Traveller cultural heritage is visible and integrated into museums and archives with acknowledgement, respect and celebration via a Traveller **Representation Scheme for Museums and Archives**.
- Promote the strategic commitments made within this strategy, and Traveller heritage more broadly, through a **dedicated annual communications plan** to be approved by the Oversight Group, to contribute to wider societal understanding and respect for Traveller heritage and the Traveller community more broadly.

Community Oversight, Engagement and Co-Design

- Continue to build trust with the Traveller community by ensuring all the actions in this strategy are monitored and informed by a **Traveller-led Oversight Group**.
- Increase and support engagement with Traveller heritage among the Traveller community by making dedicated resources and support available via a Traveller Heritage Grant Scheme.
- Travellers to be represented in all key actions arising from this strategy and routinely consulted throughout implementation and the **monitoring and evaluation process**, the findings from which will be used to constantly inform and improve delivery. Noting also, the importance of carefully balancing the desire to mainstream Traveller cultural heritage while always ensuring the wishes of the Traveller community remain at the core.

Partnership, Collaboration, Resourcing and Implementation

- **Strengthen partnerships** between the Heritage Council, Traveller organisations, Local Authorities, museums, and cultural institutions to support Traveller heritage through the delivery and monitoring of all the actions laid out within this strategy.
- **Publish and share the consultation findings**, (and other relevant material arising through this strategy) with all relevant stakeholders.
- Work closely with the Oversight Group to ensure the effective delivery of commitments and monitoring of this strategy, thereby creating the best possible conditions for seeking annual increments in the Heritage Council's **budget allocation** for the implementation of this strategy and any other related resource requirements that may arise as work on individual strategy actions progress.

Protecting, Preserving and Transferring Traveller Heritage to Future Generations

- Facilitate the transfer of Traveller heritage, language, skills and traditions across generations through the dedicated **Traveller Heritage Grant Scheme**, the online **Traveller Heritage Directory**, the potential **National Traveller Heritage Hub** and, importantly, establishing a working group to urgently examine how best to support **Traveller Language**.
- Further embed Traveller heritage as a priority across the work of the Heritage Council, across built, natural and cultural heritage, by commissioning a **discussion paper** that will establish a framework for further development of this strategy and will inform the **mid-point review** of this strategy.
- Expand the Heritage Council's heritage-based education programs to include Traveller cultural heritage at all levels, by working with the **Heritage in Schools Programme** (at primary and post-primary level) and establishing a ring-fenced **Research Ireland grant for Traveller Heritage**.

Action Plan

This action plan sets out the specific actions and outcomes that we commit to over the lifetime of this strategy. The delivery of the actions outlined within this strategy will be managed by the Cultural and Inclusive Heritage Officer, who will report to the Head of Research, Learning and Cultural Heritage. Progress against the actions outlined here will be reported to the Heritage Council via the Oversight Group. Budget commitments beyond 2026 are subject to Heritage Council's annual funding allocation.

Monitoring and Evaluation of the Heritage Council's Traveller Heritage Strategy and Work Plan

Implementation of the strategy will be monitored and evaluated by the Traveller Heritage Strategy Oversight Group, which will consist of members from a reconstitution of the Traveller Heritage Strategy Working Group and that will be underpinned by a new Terms of Reference.

The Oversight Group will agree the monitoring and evaluation framework. The Oversight Group will provide biannual reports on the strategy's implementation to the Board of the Heritage Council, outlining progress against agreed timelines and commitments, highlighting any challenges, and other pertinent information.

The Oversight Group will build regular engagement with the Traveller community and Traveller representative bodies into how the effectiveness and impact of this strategy will be evaluated and monitored. The findings from this monitoring and evaluation will be used to inform all Heritage Council operations, decision-making processes, and stakeholder engagement as well as the implementation of this strategy specifically.

Appendix 2: Traveller Heritage Strategy Consultation

The Heritage Council, supported by consultants' Workhouse Union, and under the guidance of the Traveller Heritage Strategy Working Group, undertook a national consultation with the Traveller community to inform the development of this strategy. This consultation was formed of three phases, the first of which was a series of six focus-group style sessions that then informed the design of a series of four larger engagement workshops. The final phase consisted of two creative workshops with young Travellers. The phase 1 focus-group style sessions took place in Cork, Dublin, Galway, Tuam, Tullamore and online with a total of 65 participants overall. The workshops took place in Cork, Dublin, Galway and Tullamore with a total of c.60 participants. The final phase creative workshop sessions took place in Dublin and the second in Tuam.

All consultation was co-facilitated by members of the Traveller community. Four national Traveller representative bodies (Pavee Point Traveller and Roma Centre, Irish Traveller Movement, National Traveller Women's Forum and Mincéirs Whiden) as well as Exchange House Ireland in Dublin and the Western Traveller and Intercultural Development Centre in Tuam, acted as co-organisers of the consultation events and participation was promoted through their networks.
